

ONION SEED IN FIRM MARKET

California Company Pays \$1 A Hundred in Field, and Not yet Topped

LAKE LABISH, Aug. 24.—According to reliable report a California seed company has contracted a number of local onions for seed at \$1 a hundred in the field, untopped. The acreage, according to the report, is something over 75 thus contracted.

This makes prospects for a fair early price on comestible onions a bit rosier. At a dollar per hundred the grower can make money. Some growers by doing most of their own work can make a small profit on 75c or less.

Hay Yield Good
Local upland farmers are cutting their alfalfa hay for the third time, with a fairly heavy yield reported. The hay has grown remarkably fast in the past three weeks. A number of farmers have had their grain hay baled for winter use.

Many large strawberry patches have been plowed under. The past season's experience, where in many growers were unable to sell their crops, has put a definite crimp in that phase of agriculture. The land may be set out in raspberries, loganberries, or potatoes planted.

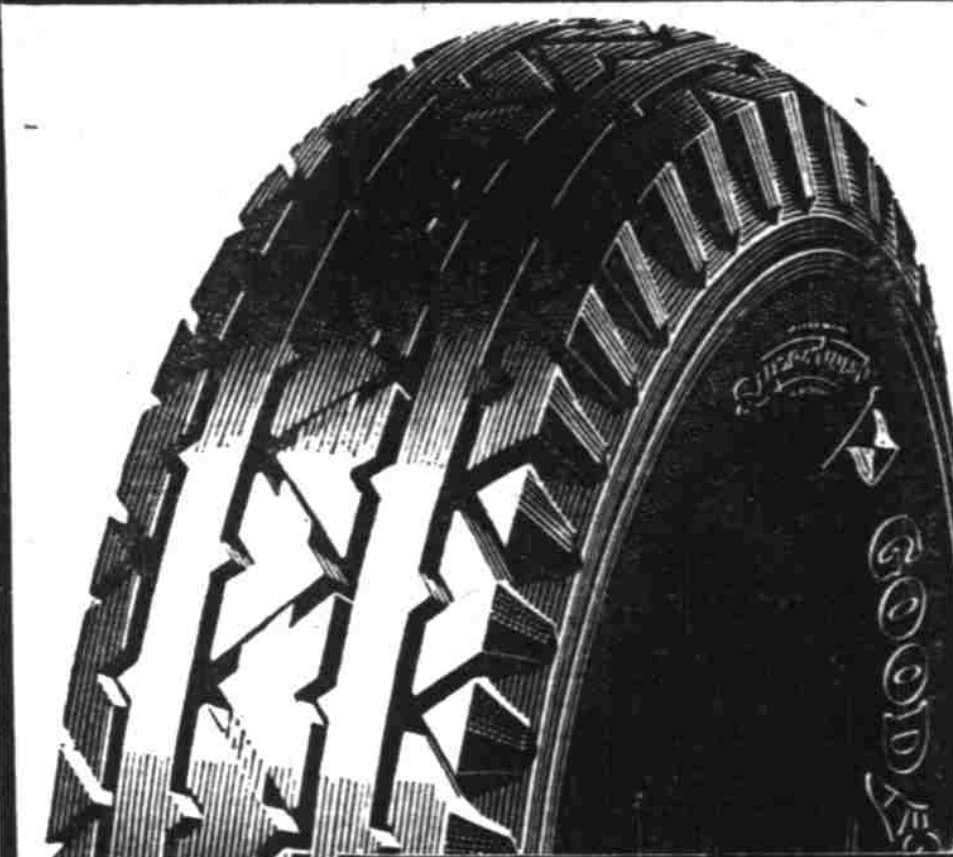
