

HARVEST TIME ON IN BOTTOM

Thrashing Season Ending, Hop Picking Coming on, Peach Harvest at Hand

MISSION BOTTOM, Aug. 25—A beehive of activity in Mission Bottom with thrashing season just closing, peach harvest at its peak and hoppers preparing under way.

When the grain crops of Robert Cole and Adam Lapin are thrashed this week Mission Bottom will see the windup of this work for another year. The Joe Pitts machine is operating here.

Farmers are busy harvesting their peach crops which in most orchards excels that of last year, both in quality and quantity.

Roadside Stands Busy
Roadside stands are established at the Frank Felton, T. B. Jones and LaFollette orchards. Bert and Ray Jones have purchased the Van O. Kelly Crawford crops. Seventy-five cents a bushel is what most growers are getting.

A new orchard planted to the J. H. Hale variety of peaches is that of A. L. Lamb. Picking will start about September 1, and he expects to harvest around 2000 bushels from his 30 acres.

Early Hops Excellent
Picking of early hops in the C. C. Russell yard began Thursday. Russell has a fine crop of both early and late hops this year.

Van O. Kelley has finished building a new store to be used during hoppers season. Although a part of Mr. Kelley's hops were not trained up until June 22 this year, he expects an excellent yield. "In spite of the heavy attack of downy mildew this spring hops have set on well and filled out surprisingly," he said.

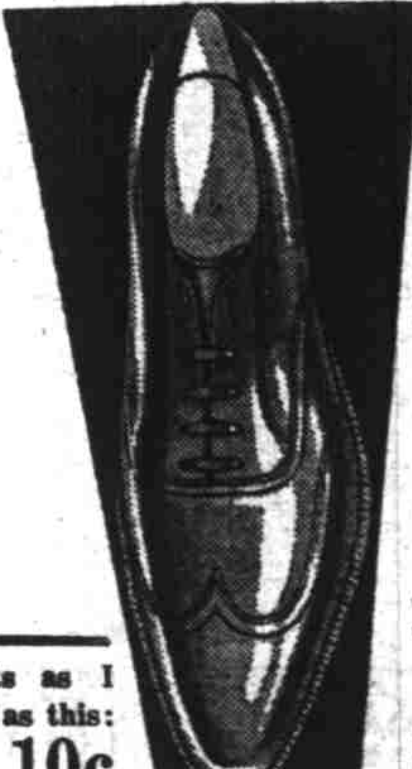
