NATIONAL GUARD'S BUDGET TO BE CUT

Adjutants General Called To Portland Meeting; White Takes Lead

Reduction of the national guard budget, without interfering with basic training requirements, probably will be the principal topic of discussion at a conference of war department officials with adjutants general of the eight states of the ninth corps military area to be held in Portland Sept. 11-12. The conference was announced by Major General White, commander of the national guard in the northwest states.

White said proposals had been made for reducing ammunition costs, building projects at camp sites, travel of inspectors and other activities that would entail a saving this year of approximately \$3,000,000.

"The proposed reductions have my hearty support," White declared. He said he believed full approval of the proposed action would be reflected by all of the eight states represented at the conference. No reduction of the 15-day field training, pay tables or armory drills is intended.

The visitors will be entertained at a dinner to be served by the Oregon National Guard association Sunday night. There also will be trips over the Columbia river bridge and other similar attractions.

Included among those who will attend the conference are Major General George E. Leach, representing the war department; and members of his staff: Brigadier General Maurice Thompson, adjutant general of Washington; Brigadier General William G. Williams, commander of the Utah national guard; Brigadier General Seth E. Howard, adjutant general of California; Colonel Erastus Williams, adjutant general of Montana; Colonel Marvin G. McConnell, adjutant general of Idaho; Lieutenant Colonel Rhodolph L. Emsay, adjutant general of Wyoming; and Lieutenant Jay H. White, adjutant general of Nevada.

KEYES, PIONEER OF OREGON PASSES ON

Zachary Taylor Keyes, father of Walter E. Keyes, Salem attorney, passed away early Thursday morning at his son's home in this city. He lived here for the last 10 years, enjoying a peaceful old age with his son. A native of Johnson county, Tennessee, where he was born September 18, 1846, he was thus in his 86th year at the time of his death. He retained his vigor quite well but had fallen the last six months, and did not rally from a heart attack yesterday morning.

Mr. Keyes came to Oregon as a young man, just after the close of the civil war, making the trip in 1868 from Tennessee via the Panama canal to the then small pioneer town of Portland. He resided in Corvallis for two years. About 1870 he located in Wheeler county, near Mitchell, driving a band of 600 sheep over the mountains to start his band. He continued ranching in eastern Oregon until he retired and came to Salem to live.

In 1880 Mr. Keyes was united in marriage to Amanda Viola Booth, daughter of the famous circuit rider, Rev. Robert Booth, whose statue graces the grounds of the state capitol. She passed away in 1917.

Mr. Keyes is survived by three sons, H. D., who resides on the John Day river; Custer of Mitchell and Walter E. of Salem; also by a sister in the east and one in Tennessee and by a brother in eastern Oregon.

The body will be sent back to Fossil to rest beside his wife. Funeral services will be held in Fossil Saturday at 2 o'clock. W. T. Rignold and Son have charge of the arrangements.

Smith Admits He Is One Involved In Welch Death

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 24.—(AP)—Carl Scott Smith, 41, was held on a manslaughter charge here today in connection with the death yesterday of Harry P. Welch, 65, Portland, Smith went voluntarily to police headquarters this afternoon and gave himself up.

Detectives said Smith admitted meeting Welch Sunday afternoon here where the latter was discovered with a fractured skull, but said he was too drunk at the time to recall details of what happened. Detectives said Smith told them he believed he staggered into Welch and the force of the impact knocked him to the pavement.

Chemeketa to Consider Lease At Breitenbush

Salem Chemeketa plan a trip to Breitenbush springs this week and, where they have been invited to stop at the cabin of Dr. Laban Steeves. Dr. Steeves has offered the Chemeketa a lease on his cabin for a term of years and the members will study the cabin and its location with a view to making it their temporary mountain headquarters. From Breitenbush numerous hikes are possible, including one to Jefferson park. The start will be made from the Senator hotel tomorrow afternoon, return trip being made Sunday night.

Simpson Claims Enforcement is Discriminatory

Protest will be made at the next council meeting by Earl C. Simpson over the way in which the ordinance preventing street display and sale of goods is being enforced, Simpson declared yesterday. He said city police had forbidden him to sell potatoes and apples, home-grown products, in front of his store at 598 North Commercial street.

Simpson characterized the ruling as discriminatory and pointed to displays of automobiles being made on several walks and parking strips in the downtown district. Simpson said he was convinced the ordinance, if enforced, should apply to all types of merchandise. He said sales of county grown products had fallen down noticeably since the ordinance was enforced at his place of business.

Simpson said he had already made complaint to the council committee on police composed of Watson Townsend, chairman; Hal D. Patton and Dr. O. A. Olson.

Repossession is Basis of Action

R. J. Matthecheck of McMinnville filed suit in court here asking damages of \$8542 from Percy J. and Grace E. Pugh whom he claims wrongfully took property of the plaintiff in the repossession of the Olympic apartments on North Liberty street. Matthecheck declares the furnishings in the apartment were not subject to repossession and that the defendants wronged him in the sum named when they seized all the property, real and personal, November 3, 1930.
