Green peppers also took a drop, coming down from eight cents, wholesale early in the week, to four cents yesterday. They were selling two for 15 cents retail. Faced with large stocks of old watermelons, dealers entered into see-saw market, it was reported. At wholesale they were selling for one to one and a quarter cents. This price does not even pay the freight, dealers say. The operators were in a quandary as to whether or not to start selling new stocks.
