PEOPLE'S UTILITY PHOPOSAL REATEN

Unfavorable Vote in two of Units Involved Defeat Issue, is Ruling

Because two of the seven municipalities and parcels which participated in the recent election ty, voted adverse to the measure, the state hydro-electric commission is precluded from issuing a longer. proclamation declaring that the district was created, Attorney General Van Winkle held in an opinion Saturday.

The records show that 1060 voters cast their ballots in favor of the district with \$55 opposed. Four municipalities and one parcel in the county voted for formation of the district while Nehalem and Wheeler voted against it.

The hydro-electric commission requested the attorney general to give an opinion as to whether the


