**CROPS LARGE; PRICES SMALL**  
 Harvest on Throughout This County; Prune Growers Are in Quandary

BROOKS, Aug. 27—Practically all the threshing of grain and baling of hay is completed in this section, and a large portion already hauled to the warehouses. An extra good yield is reported. Pickings of the late Crawford peaches began last week in this section, and are bringing the grower one dollar a bushel. The peach crop is very heavy this year and the peaches are of fine quality.

The picking of the early cluster hops will start Monday morning in the Gouley yard, near the warehouse. Mr. and Mrs. E. Andrews and Miss Gertrude Simon were recent guests of Mr. and Mrs. John Zielinski. Miss Simons has been doing nursing and missionary work in China and is home on a year's furlough.

**GREEN PRUNES PICKED**  
 LIBERTY, Aug. 27—The picking of green prunes from the trees is starting here. Indications point to a smaller tonnage to be dried than usual. Quite a number of growers do not know yet what they will do with the crop when ripe, either dry, sell to canneries, or it might be cheaper not to bother with the crop at all.

**GATHER EARLY HOPS**  
 FALLS CITY, Aug. 27—Early hops around Independence have called a number of families and many more are planning on leaving for various yards to pick the late crop. Those leaving to do early picking are Mr. and Mrs. H. Ruland going to the Wigwag yard. Mr. and Mrs. Art Rose and family and Mrs. Anna Gardner to the Pankella yard; Mr. and Mrs. Jake Weble and Walter and Donald Clark to Hannicuts yard; Mr. and Mrs. Frank Whitte, Thelma and Woodrow Robinson to the Slopper yard; Julius Ward left Thursday for hop work at Dallas.

**EAST WOODBURN, Aug. 27—**Threshing has been completed in this vicinity and the threshing has moved out. The grain yield was rather disappointing. While there was plenty of straw, the heads did not yield so well. The wheat varied from 15 to 30 bushels per acre.

People are now getting ready for hop picking. The Shaner hop yard was winter killed and had to be plowed out, but J. C. Tedder of Parkersville has rented the hop house and will dry his hops there. There are many more pickers than jobs this year despite the fact that harvesting prices have been cut considerably over former years. The downy mildew has hurt some of the yards but not to any great extent.

J. F. Rigdon and A. M. Van Cleave are now harvesting their peach crop and expect to find a ready market at the low prevailing price.

Tom Haugen, A. M. Vistica, and E. E. Rickard are picking their evergreen berries. They are just receiving a boat a pound for their product, and due to these prices others are leaving the berries on the vines.

He also was badly bruised by the fall. Chester fractured the same arm while playing at school last year. He is now carrying it in a sling.
