CORN, OATS LEAD WHEAT UPWARI PRUNES SCANTY, DEMAND IS GOOD

Advance is on Theory Grains Below Other Commodities

CHICAGO, Aug. 29-(AP)-Buying power was evident in all grain pits today, but the coarse grains, corn and oats, almost took the play away from wheat. Wheat was active after an early attack of profit-taking had been quelled, but corn and oats enjoyed prosperity too. Demand for these cereals, based on belief that rising trends in other commodity markets made grains look cheap by comparison, was the heaviest in some time. Traders again disregarded routine news and followed stock market firmness and sensational advances in cotton.

Wheat closed strong at almost the day's top level and 1 1-8 to 1 5-8 above Saturday's finish. Corn also was strong and 1 to 1-7-8 higher, oats 5-8-1 up. Today's closing quotations: Wheat: Sept., old, .54 5-8-3-4;




