After having traveled over 80,000 miles through jungles and civilization as the secretary of F. M. Mitchell-Hedges, internationally famous explorer, Miss Jane Harvey Houison, slim young English girl, is emphatic in admitting that she prefers life in the wilderness to that of our great cities. Miss Houison, who has spent months in the jungles of Central America without seeing another woman, scoffs at the popular conception of the jungle as a place of savagery and death. She points out that a country where 20,000 people commit suicide and 54,000 more are moved down by automobiles in a year hasn't much room to talk about savagery. She furthermore draws attention to the fact that a native of the jungle is honest in his criminal activities. If he's going to kill you he'll come right at you from the front and will not employ the dark alley methods of the city gunman. Miss Houison is returning to the jungle when Mitchell-Hedges lecture tour of the United States is completed. Strangely enough, two prominent fellow-countrywomen of Miss Houison have similar ideas about the relative merits of the wilds and civilization that she has. They are Lady Louis Mountbatten, cousin of King George of England, and her friend, the Marchioness of Milford Haven, who have professed themselves tired of palaces and drawing-rooms and are planning to start on an expedition through the hand-dreaded interior of Peru early next month. They will travel alone on a course that will take them to the Caspian Sea to the Gulf of Oman.

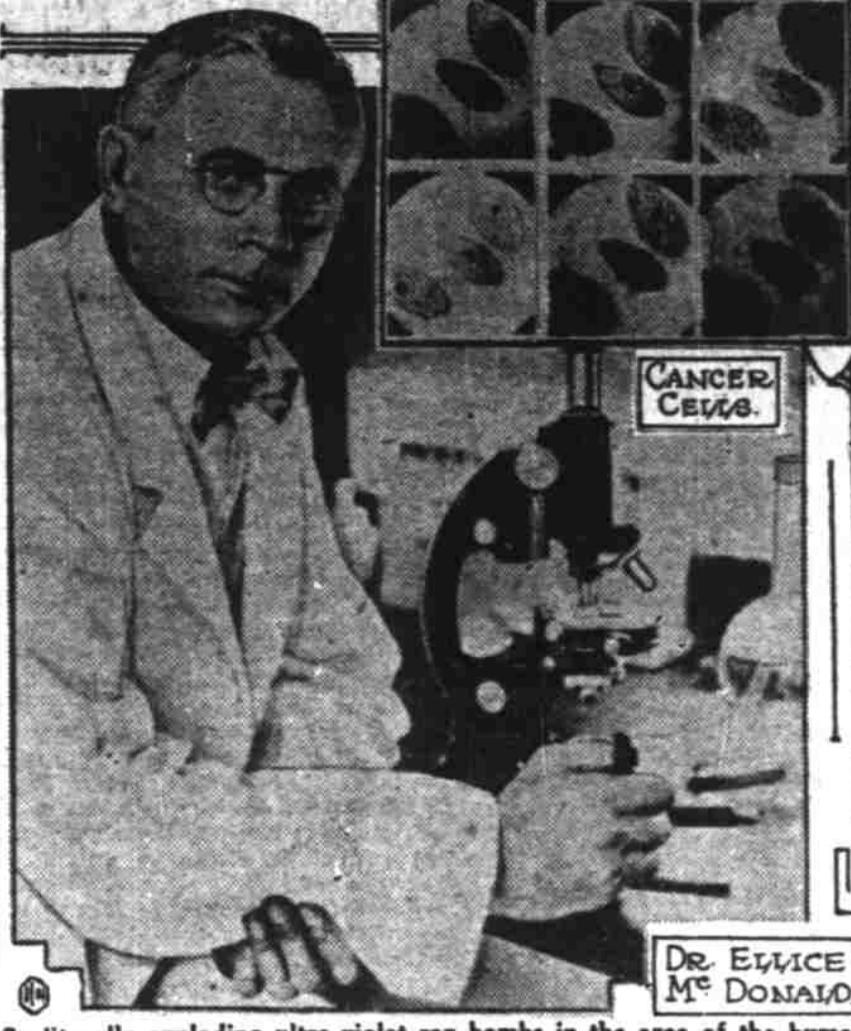

## NEW CANCER CURE HOPED FOR



By literally exploding ultra-violet ray bombs in the area of the human body affected with cancer, it is believed and hoped that a new and more effective treatment can be applied to cancer than hitherto has been possible. A report of the new forces made before the American Chemical Society, at Denver, Col., by Dr. Ellice McDonald, of the cancer research laboratories of the University of Pennsylvania, explains the new method of applying ultra-violet rays to cancer cells, no matter how deeply seated. The rays are planted in the affected area of the body like bombs, by injecting certain chemical compounds. The chemicals remain latent until subjected to the X-rays. Then they are transformed into ultra-violet flames which literally bombard the nucleus of the cancer cell until it is destroyed. The rays are lethal to all body cells, the report explains, but as some cells require a different wave length, the problem confronting science is to find the correct radiation for the treatment of cancer cells. An interesting phase of the discovery is that the ultra-violet rays set in action within the body produce internal sunburns.
