CURING OF MUTTON WILL BE STUDIED

MONMOUTH, Sept. 9.—A demonstration of brine-curing and smoking mutton will be held Saturday, September 10, at the James Riddell farm north of Monmouth, as an aid to sheep men in disposing of their mutton; also as a means of providing cheap meat for relief purposes.

The state college extension service is sponsoring this and subsequent demonstrations of the same sort, throughout the state. H. A. Lindgren, livestock specialist from Oregon State will be assisted by J. R. Beck, Polk county agent.

A practical method of home butchering of mutton, also preparation and treatment of the meat for the curing processes, will be demonstrated. Sheep men and home makers interested in either selling or preserving for home use are invited to attend this meeting beginning at 9 a. m. September 10.
