# Veteran Patrolman Looks Back as New Road Graded

WACONDA, Sept. 12—Graveling of the new Wheatland Ferry market road has been under way about a week. Work on this three-mile stretch was started last winter when relief work of clearing brush began. For the past three weeks, grading, leveling, widening, and cutting curves, has employed 27 men with teams and

as many men working single handed. Along this route the old road bed has been followed save for cuts to avoid sharp corners. Few fills have been made because the land overflows during high water periods. During high water last winter the bridge near Hubbard hill was washed out, and is being replaced by a piling bridge, with Philip Fischer in charge. A concrete bridge was constructed at Patterson hill this spring. Until last January Richard Patterson was road patrolman, making him 18 years of service. When he began work in this capacity there was one mile of graded road in his territory, this along with is now the Salem-Champoeg highway.

# BLAZE FROM FIELD JUMPS TO TIMBER

HOPEWELL, Sept. 12—A timber fire spread rapidly in the Gilcrest wood near Andrew Sipola's farm Friday. Isaac Bantsari had started the fire in a stubble field on the Howard Stephens' place. The blaze escaped his control and spread rapidly through the wood and up the canyon.

Prune pickers in Sipola's orchard were the first to notice the fire at 3:30 p. m. and tried to extinguish it. Many men from the neighborhood quickly gathered to their aid and after various attempts were able to stop it at 9 by a ditch. It covered 40 acres before it was under control. Several buildings were in range of the fire. A cow was found in time but very scared.

Prune picking has started on several farms. The crop in parts is large. The price is from \$6 to \$10 a ton.
