SHARES STRONGER BUT GAINS SLIGHT

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Stocks found enough stamina to emerge from a nervous, erratic session on the upside today, although the net gain failed by a small margin to cancel all of Wednesday's loss.

Trading was active, but firmness in wheat and a rally in cotton helped turn the trend and advancing tendencies gained strength through the last hour. Gains averaged 2.5 points in a turnover of 4,157,610 shares.

Advances of around a couple of points each were made by U. S. Steel, American Telephone, Bethlehem, Allied Chemical, Anacosta, Consolidated Gas, Southern Pacific, New York Central, Du Pont and Public Service of New Jersey. Wheat's rise of from a fraction to about a cent lifted farm implement issues, International Harvester moving up 4 and Case 2-Union Pacific was 4 1/2 and higher. In General Electric, American Smelting, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, American Tobacco Co., Goodyear, American Can and Union Carbide gains amounted to a point or more.

EUROPEAN BUYING HELPS GRAINS

EGG PRICES GAIN CENT LOCALLY

Four Million Bushels Taken in Canada; Spread Great

CHICAGO, Sept. 15.—Immense buying of Canadian wheat for Europe together with overseas purchasing of 500,000 bushels from this country, put backbone into grain values today.

About 4,000,000 bushels of Canadian wheat was taken today by trans-Atlantic shippers, making upward of 1,000,000 bushels this week. Another stimulating factor was knowledge the price spread between Chicago and Liverpool had widened greatly, with the difference the sharpest witnessed in many weeks.

Wheat closed firm, 1/4 above yesterday's finish, corn 1/4 up, oat unchanged to 1/4 higher.

was the place of beginnings.

Here was the seat of activities that started the movement that preserved this coast for the stars and stripes; that led to the extension of the arc of the republic from the snows of the Rockies to the sands of the Pacific.

Made this coast, ultimately to be the greatest, richest and most populous of our country—made this coast American instead of British, from California's southern border to the international line between the United States and Canada.

Both California and Washington, with little comparatively, have done much to preserve their historic values—while, so far, Oregon, with infinitely more in that field than both of them put together, has done little. Even the other states west of the Rockies, like Idaho and Nevada and Montana and Wyoming, have each done more along this line so far than Oregon has done.

Standards and Extras Up, Mediums yet At old Mark

Breaking the long fall steadyness in this market, local egg buying prices showed a cent yesterday on extras and standards, to 20 and 19 cents, respectively. Medium eggs held at 16 cents. No other changes were listed in the local markets yesterday.

BETTER GRADE EGG PRICES HOLDING UP

PORTLAND, Sept. 15.—(AP)—The advance in extra and standard eggs of 1c doz., as announced yesterday, effective today was being generally followed by the trade, although outside interests attacks on the Portland price structure by pushing the sales of undergrades.

Trading in the butter market is firm here with prices strong to higher in spots for cubes despite the weakness in the east. An advance in low grade is shown for the 1c session.

The high price on chickens at San Francisco compared with Portland is forcing additional movement in this direction. Lights are quoted around 13 and 14c there compared with 7-9c here.

Shortage of country killed calves continues here altogether it has been slightly modified during the last day or so. Prices, however, remain at the full point. Hogs and lambs are steady.

Recent advances in the price of potatoes are not being fully maintained in the Yakima section, where the chief rises were shown following the government report of a smaller crop. Portland is the weakest point on account of the trade being filled up with No. 2 grade.

Slightly easier situation is reflected in the cantaloupe market with an extreme of \$1.10 quoted locally. The market for this is still heavy. Volume of sales in the peach trade are steadily decreasing. Poor packs of Yakima are more noticeable and this has hurt sales from there. Prices continue with little change however.
