HIGHWAY WIDENING BIDS TO BE OPENED

Bids for grading, widening and gravel shoulder construction of 5.1 miles of the Pacific highway between Astoria and Woodburn are to be considered Wednesday, September 18, when the state highway commission meets in Portland. Work on new highways and bridges to be considered at the gathering aggregates \$700,000, the state highway engineer's office announced Thursday.

The specifications set out that with the exception of the Columbia slough bridge, and Lobster Mountain section of Alsea-Deadwood secondary highway in Benton county, skilled and unskilled labor shall not be permitted to work more than 30 hours in any one week.

Successful bidders will be required to pay a minimum wage of less than 60 cents an hour less than 60 cents an hour for skilled labor.

25th Annual Seed Harvest Is Finished

BRUSH CREEK, Sept. 16.—For the 25th consecutive year, the vegetable seed crop has been harvested from the Madson farm on Paradise Road. Victor Madson, grower, completed the cleaning of the seed and had it shipped to Portland by truck Wednesday. The crop proved an average one this season. Rutabagas, turnips and kale were grown.

M. J. Madson grew his first vegetable seed here under contract for a Portland company in 1907. Since then he raised seed each consecutive year until his death, six years ago. Since then his son Victor Madson, has continued the seed growing on the same farm, contracting with the same company.

Seed men remark that seed here is more apt to run true to type than that grown in areas where many varieties are grown. In the seed interpollination is more apt to take place. Portland seed houses have frequently grown some of their best seed in the Willamette valley, the officials have said.

BOOTLEG LICENSES BEING CHECKED UP

Names of 240 alleged bona fide residents of Oregon, who have purchased current motor vehicle licenses in the state of Oregon, were received at the office of the secretary of state yesterday.

These names are being checked against the Oregon motor vehicle records. In most cases the names of the purchasers of these Washington license plates will be referred to the state police for investigation.

A large number of names of Oregon residents who have purchased 1932 motor vehicle license plates in California also have been received at the state department.

In cases where it is found that the purchasers of foreign license plates are bona fide residents of Oregon, they will be cited to appear in court, and will be compelled to buy Oregon licenses.
