### Will Honor Centennial of Evangelical Church; Program Listed

One hundred years of Sunday school work is the history now written by the Evangelical church. The first Sunday school of the denomination was organized in Lebanon, Pa., in the autumn of 1832. This event is being celebrated everywhere throughout the church by a special program stressing the importance of Christian education.

Clear Lake, Labish Center, and Middle Grove, the three societies of Labish Mission of the Evangelical church are cooperating Sunday in a program at the Clear Lake church with members of each point participating. The Eldridge Sunday school has been invited to unite in this anniversary memorial. A pioneer of the work, Dr. W. C. Kautner, will be the special guest speaker of the occasion.

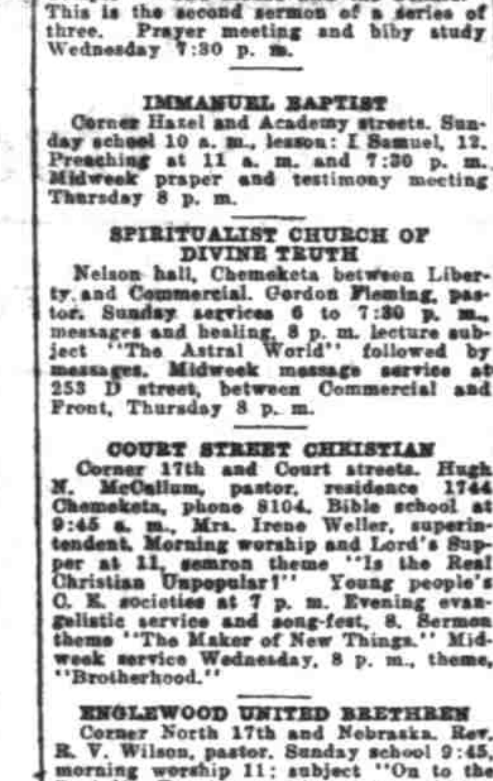

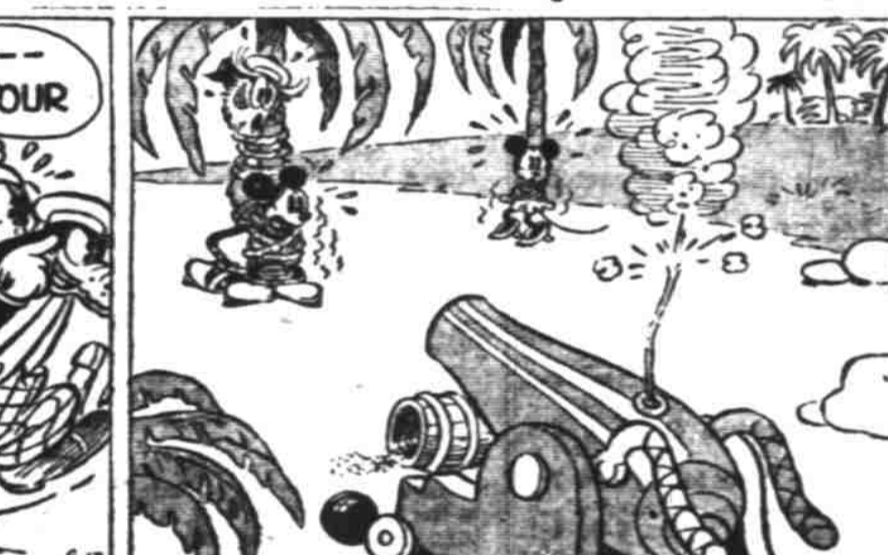

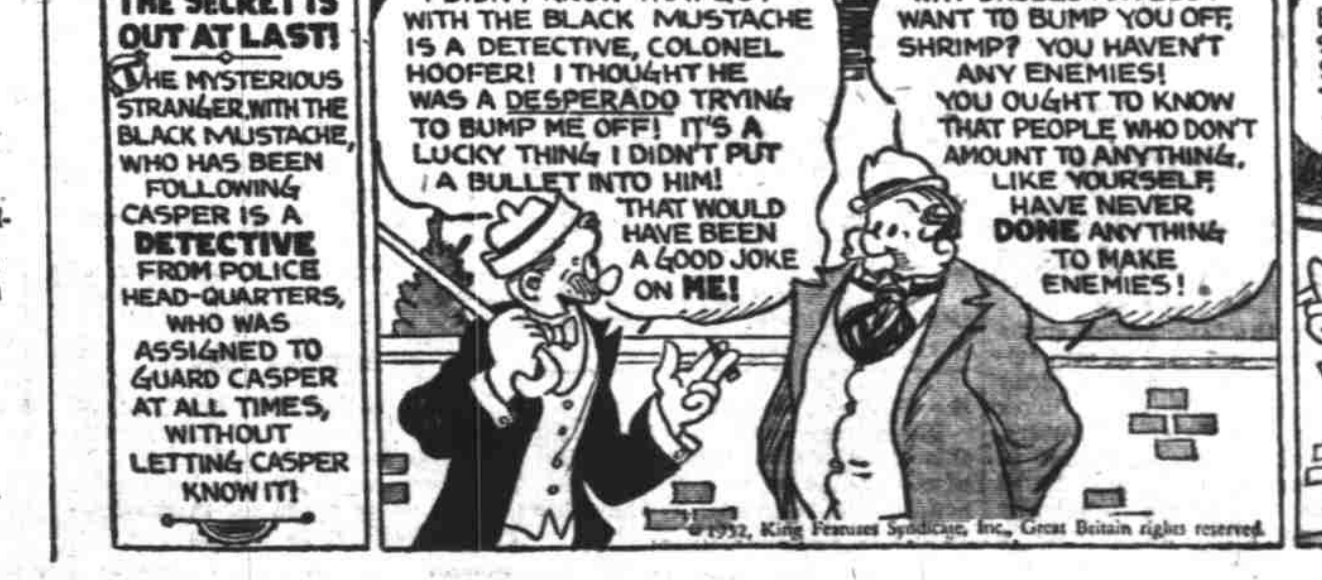
