



The district was organized in 1856, on the Boothby donation land claim and some of the founders were: William Goodwin, Alexander McNary, Hugh McNary, J. C. Allen, J. M. Barnes, P. M. Hill, G. J. Basket, J. Hughs, T. J. Riggs, J. M. Fulkerson, Arthur Engles, James Richards, Jesse Morris and Hugh Harris.

The first teacher was N. F. (Poley) Nelson whose father operated a store and postoffice nearby. Other teachers were Minerva Knox, Nellie Stipp, Thomas Ellis, V. F. Jones, Harvey Wallace and Billy Livermore.




