

LUTHERAN MEN PLAN MEETING

Pastors From Northwest to Be Entertained Next Week at Aurora

AURORA, Sept. 29.—Tuesday and Wednesday, October 4 and 5, Lutheran pastors of the American Lutheran church from all parts of Oregon and Washington west of the Cascades and from British Columbia, will be entertained by Christ Lutheran church of Aurora. This is a meeting of pastors where phases of their work will be discussed, essays on theological and practical church matters presented, and special needs of the times stressed and spiritual impetus given.

Tuesday night at 8 o'clock will be held the conference service, with sermon by Rev. F. J. Moller of Vancouver, B. C. The pastors will attend communion in a body. A minister's quartet will sing.

Varied Topics Proposed
Among the papers to be discussed will be: "Communism in the Light of the Word of God," "How Can a Spiritual Awakening of the Church be Attained?" "Unemployment and the Church," "Can Evolution, as Scientifically Understood, be Harmonized with the Lutheran Conception of the Fall and the Atonement?" "Turning Our Church Societies into Assets."

There will also be committee recommendations by the chairman on evangelism, christian education, student support, finance, reading course, student service, Luther league and the state of the church.

Prof. J. P. Pfeuffer of Pacific Lutheran college of Portland, Wash., is chairman and Rev. A. F. Knorr of Aurora secretary of the conference. The sessions begin at 9 a. m. daily and continue with intermissions till 4:30 p. m. Meetings are open to all and the public is especially urged to attend the evening service.
