

RAIN NEED OF FARMERS NOW

Fall Plowing Held Back or Done Under Handicap; Harvests Closing

ZENA, Sept. 29.—Polk county farmers are beginning to think that Indian summer is here, with its brilliant sunshine and mild, lovely nights. Usually at this time of year the fields have been prepared by rains for fall plowing and in some instances farmers have had all of their fall plowing and seeding done by the middle of October.

"Dry Farming" Tried
This fall the farmers are looking in vain for rain clouds. When dry farming, as it is called when the farmer plows in moistureless ground, the horses lose in flesh and the driver, who is working in a cloud of dust from early morning until sundown, is covered with a fine dirt which, when mingled with perspiration, makes him a muddy looking object indeed.

Farmers who work with tractors have done some plowing but generally most of the fall plowing is done after the first hard rains.
