

FANNIE DRAKE IS FOUND DEAD

Silverton Pioneer, ill for
Weeks, Dies Sometime
Friday Night

SILVERTON, Oct. 1 — Mrs. Fannie Drake, pioneer of the Silverton district, was found dead in her bed this morning at 7 o'clock. Mrs. Drake had been ill for several months but was seemingly no worse recently.

Her niece, Mrs. George Custer and Miss LaVerne Herick called on Mrs. Drake Friday night and reported that she seemingly felt better than usual. Her physician said that she had been dead some hours. She was found by Edith Benson who has made her home with Mrs. Drake for the past 14 years.

Mrs. Drake was born May 2, 1858, at the donation land claim of her parents, R. L. and Nancy Hinkle Millster on the Meridian road between Mount Angel and Monitor. She was married to Charles Wesley Drake on January 22, 1877 and had lived in her present home at 401 South Water street at Silverton for over 40 years. Her husband died in 1911.

Mrs. Drake is survived by two sons, E. R. Drake of Sacramento, Cal., and June D. Drake of Silverton; three grandchildren, Wallace Drake of Seattle and Charles H. and Ardith Drake of Silverton; five sisters, Ida Graves and Bertha Woodside of Molalla, Della Smith of White Salmon, Wash., Lettie Davenport of Tennessee and Beda Keriursch of Alaska.

Funeral arrangements are in charge of Jack and Ekman and interment will be made in the Silverton cemetery. Arrangements are not completed as word is awaited from the son in California.

Mrs. Drake was a charter member of the Pythian Sisters, of the Neighbors of Woodcraft and of the Women's Relief Corps.

SILVERTON, Oct. 1 — Mrs. Arthur Sallenger was brought to her mother's home here this week following a serious operation and illness at the Sellwood hospital at Portland. She will remain with her mother, Mrs. Andrew Hodges here until she is sufficiently strong to return to her own home. Since 1883, Humphreys' Record of Fair Going Is Continuous One, They Say

RICKEY, Oct. 1.—When asked how many years she had attended the state fair, Mrs. W. H. Humphreys answered promptly that she could not remember ever missing a year since 1883, the year she with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Ashby, moved from eastern Oregon to Marion county.

Mr. Humphrey laughed and "just could not remember" when he began attending.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. ("Doc") Humphreys came to Marion county in 1853 and Mr. Humphreys supposed that he began attending as soon as he arrived, as the family had always attended the fair and he cannot remember ever missing one so he supposed that they always took

him along. Mr. Humphrey's father used to exhibit Merino sheep and was among the first to exhibit Shropshire sheep.

Mother Was Exhibitor
His mother used to exhibit hand work and won a first prize on a cushion when she was past 80 years of age. Mrs. Margaret Wilson, his grandmother, exhibited "pieced" quilts which were works of art and on which she won prizes.

Mr. Humphreys used to exhibit driving horses. The Humphrey family formerly camped but since the advent of good roads they go back and forth, and though Mrs. Humphreys is not able to attend all the time, Mr. Humphreys seldom misses a single day.
