PEACE, TOO, HATH ITS MARTYRS

The death through overwork, on the completion of his gigantic task of supervising New York's independent subway system, of Colonel John R. Slatery, makes one wonder if after all peace does not produce more heroes than war. True, the men who in peace-time work in the great Army of Progress, have none of the spectacular battlefield atmosphere that weaves a glamorous aura about the specialist in mass murder, but their work is more enduring and deserving of a more noble chapter in history. From the time of his graduation from West Point Military Academy in 1925, Col. Slatery had built up an enviable career as an army engineer, having worked practically all over the United States. In 1925 he accepted a post as deputy chief engineer on the New York Board of Transportation and supervised the building of the new subway. On its completion he was made general manager of the system. The tragedy is that he had worked so hard on the gigantic task that he did not live to enjoy his reward. Remarkably similar to the case of Colonel Slatery was that of Clifford W. Holland, builder of the vehicular tunnel that links New York and New Jersey. On the night when workmen were to drill through the last layer of rock, the sole remaining obstacle to a clear road under the Hudson River between the two states, Holland died of a heart attack in Battle Creek Sanitarium, Michigan. He, too, had not given a thought to the wear and tear on his constitution while engaged on the great engineering project. But these two heroes in the great army of progress did not die in vain, as have so many on the world's battlefields. Their achievements stand as an enduring testament that "peace, too, hath its martyrs."

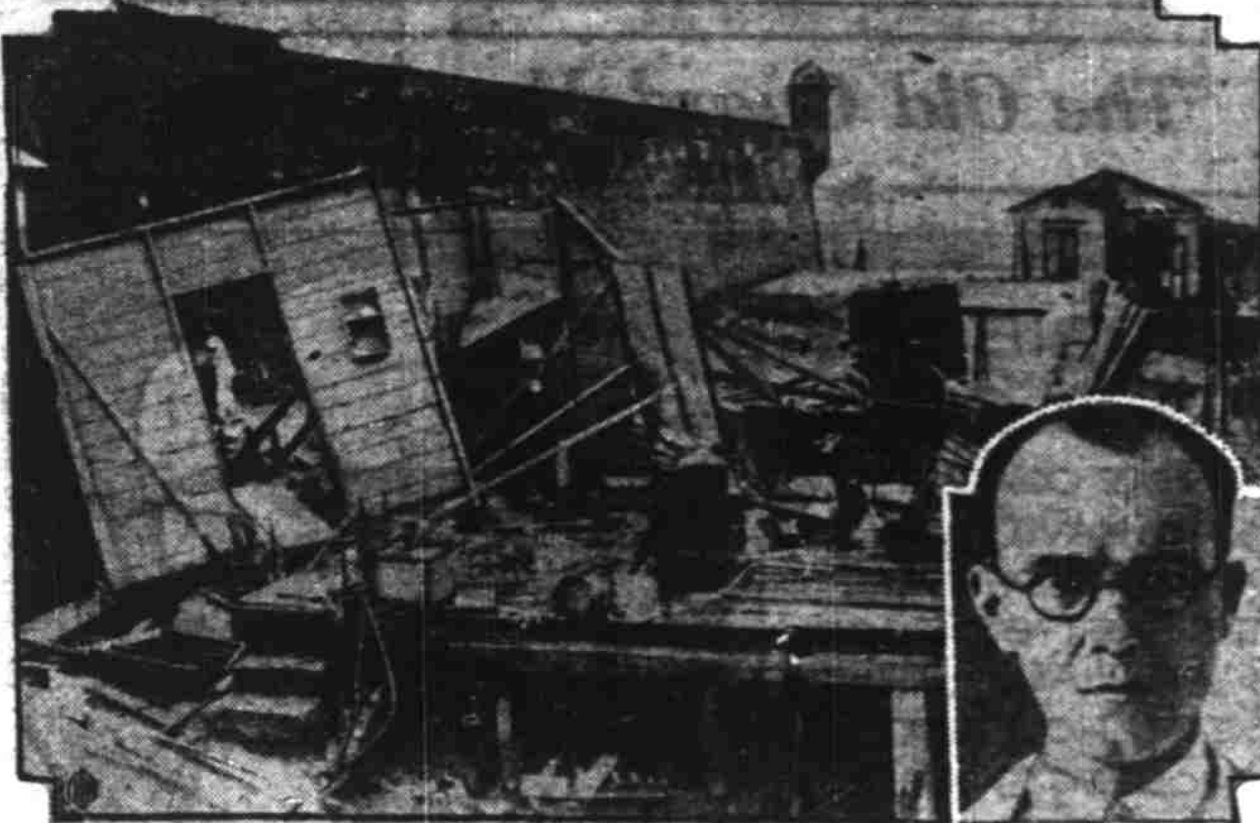

FINAL PUSH TELLS TALE ON TAX BILL

WOODBURN, Oct. 5.—The taxpayers' equalization league and other working friends of the university-state college consolidation bill can put the measure over in two weeks' intensive work. John Ramage, farmer residing near here and member of the Marion county taxpayers' league, declared here today.

Rodney Alden, editor of the Woodburn Independent, and who with Ramage is appearing at a number of meetings to talk for the bill, declares every audience before which he has spoken has been subject to reasonable argument on the bill, and anxious to hear what the backers of the merger have to say.

Every county in Oregon is organized now for putting the measure over, Ramage said, and added that more calls for speakers have come in than the league is able to supply. Columbia county wrote yesterday asking that three speakers be sent into that region.

In Marion county, the following meetings, featuring debates on the bill, are being held this week: before Monitor grange Thursday night, with Rodney Alden and Avery Thompson of Salem taking the opposite sides; at Silverton Hills grange and the Silverton chamber of commerce Friday; also at Turner and Maclean Friday night. Ramage to take the merger argument at Maclean Ramage also spoke on the measure before the Hollywood community club in Salem Tuesday night.

Fair Guests Stay at Home in Kingwood

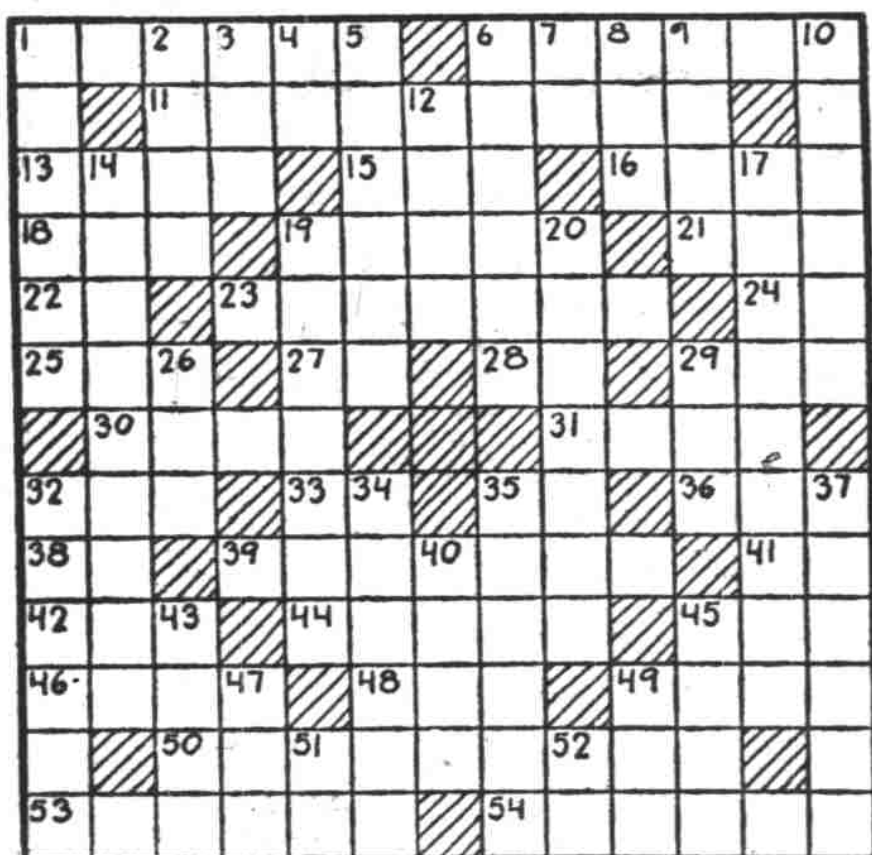
