Will run Against Newgent For Mayor; Other Candidates Named

WEST SALEM, Oct. 6 — At the mass meeting called for Tuesday evening for the purpose of nominating candidates for the city offices to be filled at the November election, J. R. Brown was elected chairman and Mrs. Miller, secretary for the meeting.

For the position of mayor, Guy C. Newgent, present incumbent and Earl S. Patton were duly nominated for councilman for the long term, Peter Poehl was the only nominee and for the short term A. V. Meyers, Lester Brannon, Ray J. Stumbo, Fred Gibson, S. L. Burke, Dr. A. F. Goffrier, Bill McAdams and Emmett Dickson were nominated. Mrs. J. L. Miller was the only one named for the position of

city recorder and L. L. Slover received the only nomination for treasurer.

There may be petitions bearing voters' signatures presented for other nominations for some of the vacancies that are to be filled, particularly for the long term of councilman, which is not supplied by those named at the mass meeting held Tuesday evening. There were not a great many out but considering that the meeting had not been advertised over 24 hours ahead, there was a good representation. The meeting was held in the community hall.
