## GASOLINE SALES IN OREGON SHOW AGAIN

Gasoline consumption in Oregon in August increased more than a million gallons over that for July, it was announced Thursday by Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state.

Hoss' statement showed that 14,879,520 gallons of gasoline was sold in August, as against 13,706,895 gallons in July. Distillate sales increased to 359,057 gallons in August, as compared with 352,526 gallons in July.

The increased consumption was reflected in the revenue collected under the state fuels laws in the amount of \$52,245.43. Tax returns from the various companies operating in August totaled \$607,748.91, as compared with \$55,505.48 in July. Although the August receipts showed an increase over those in July, they were \$37,366.90 less for the first eight months of this year, when compared with the corresponding period in 1931.

Collections from January 1 to August 31 this year aggregated \$4,327,899.62, as against \$4,779,921.44 received during the same period in 1931.

## TILLSON RECITAL IS MUCH ENJOYED

Former Salem Musician is Here Again, Mastery of Piano Shown

Salem music lovers greeted with enthusiasm the return of Edward Tillson, pianist, who appeared in salon recital last night at the Roberts studio. A former resident of Salem and instructor in piano here, Mr. Tillson then made his home for many years in San Francisco, returning a year ago following a prolonged illness. Now restored to health, he is resuming teaching and made this his first public recital.

His program was a rich one, drawing on many composers, and his rendering showed a flexibility of interpretation meeting well the moods of the numbers. There was the opening "Sonata Opus 7" by Grieg, in four movements, a work full of melody and vivacity whose "Menuetto" and "Finale" were given with such felicitous phrasing as to charm the auditors. A Chopin suite of five selections formed another major portion of the program. Four of the parts were slightly more somber than the Grieg number, emphasizing depth, though the last number, "Etude Opus 10, No. 5," is in lighter vein. A pleasing interlude between the Grieg and Chopin suites included Schubert-Liszt's "Faith in Spring" and "Hark!

Hark! the Lark". The lacy lyric of the latter was given new beauty by Prof. Tillson's hands. The closing number was the "Tannhauser March" by Wagner-Liszt. This is stirring but far less turgid and violent than most Wagnerian selections. Its recurring theme speaks plainly as the march progresses, giving it a unity which sustains interest. Prof. Tillson has stopped in first rank by virtue of his work as concert artist. He has no diverting eccentricities to mar his technique; and his perfect composure gives an audience the repose which is desirable for full appreciation of the harmonies which the composer has conceived. Those who had the privilege of hearing the recital last night hope it may be repeated at not too long an interval.
