MONUMENT TO LEE ERECTED, DALLES

An event of great interest and importance will be the dedication of the monument at The Dalles Saturday, October 15. The monument is being erected by Willamette university on the site of the old Daniel Lee mission to the Indians, honoring the mission and also the end of the overland Oregon trail.

Daniel Lee was associated with his uncle, Rev. Jason Lee, in the Oregon mission. He went to The Dalles (Waswam) and started the mission work there. After several years Daniel Lee returned to the Atlantic coast and the mission was later discontinued. While it stood, it was a flourishing outpost of religion and civilization in a savage wilderness. The funds for the monument were raised by the sale of memorial coins, the proceeds amounting to \$150. The dedication will be celebrated with formal exercises attended by many from Willamette and from The Dalles. Judge C. H. Carey of Portland, noted historian, will give the principal address. An Indian young man and young woman who are students in the university, will speak from the Indian viewpoint. Dr. C. G. Doney, Dean George H. Alden and others will be present.
