# NUT GROWERS CO-OP WHEAT CONTINUES LOWER TREND STARTING FALL RUN LAMB PRICES UP, BEEF IMPROVED

# Walnut Crop Expected Equal to 1931; Season is Late

With filberts already coming into the Salem Nut Growers association warehouse on Hood and Front streets, and walnuts starting to fall, activities among the nut growers are starting in earnest. A rain or frost would speed the walnut harvest greatly.

First grading of filberts will get under way today or tomorrow, Manager Fred Ewing said yesterday, but it will be another 10 days or two weeks before grading of walnuts is started.

The walnut season is considerably later than last year, for on October 1, in 1931 walnuts were being graded at the plant here. The walnut yield this year locally is estimated at between 320 and 340 tons or about the same as last year. While the yield is lighter than last in some quarters, it is heavier in others, and also a number of young orchards are bearing. Very little blight has bothered walnuts this year, while a great deal was experienced last year.

Filberts are way under last year, with the maximum estimate placed not at 55 tons, or 25 under the 80 tons handled by the association last year.

Two stamping machines have been ordered for the plant here, which is one of the four units of the Nut Growers co-op with selling headquarters at the Dundee plant. If these machines arrive in time, a large share of the nuts going through the local plant will be stamped, thus bringing a cent more per pound.

Opening price on wainuts is three cents a pound less than the opener last year, with Oregon Franquettes quoted at 18 cents. Grading and shelling for meats will be hurried here in order to get shipments east for the holiday trade, and for a portion of the season day and night shifts will be handled at the plant, Mr. Ewing says. Last year grading was completed December 1. Last year 24 tons of nut meats

were cracked at the plant here, the extra white halves being in demand on the main California markets, despite fact that California is a great nut producing state. The tonnage, or more, of the
