College Hordes Invade Portland for Big Gridiron Battle

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 7 -(AP)-Football fans and college students by the thousands rolled into Portland late today and tonight for the annual football battle between the state universities of Washington and Oregon.

Those in charge of ticket distribution said there was every reason to believe the attendance would exceed 30,000. The Oregon-Washington game two years ago drew a crowd of 35,600. This afternoon the box office reported that 22,000 tickets had been disposed of and a line a half-block long stood in front of the downtown wicket.

Two thousand Oregon students were to descend upon the city tonight, and 3,000 more were coming from University of Washington, while about 7,000 other visitors from that state were expected.

The Washington and Oregon bands arrived during the day, to take part in five special broadcasts over local radio stations.

The Oregon football team reached Portland early this afternoon and Prink Callison, coach, took his boys to the stadium for a workout. Jimmy Phelan's Washington team was due here tonight. There will be no workout for them before the game which starts at 2 p. m.



**Benny's Comeback Stopped** By Technical Kayo; Is Still Game

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Oct 7. -- (AP) --A pale, blood - flecked, slightly baldish figure, the shadow of one of the geratest lightweights of all time, sagged helplessly into the arms of the referee tonight and Benny Leonard was at the end of the comeback trail-the victim of the youthful punching of Jimmy McLarnin.

With only five seconds of the sixth round to go, Referee Arthur Donovan stoped the fight and awarded the vertict to McLarnin on a technical knockout, Leonard, his resistance gone and even his once superb defense no longer effective, was swaying groggily under a hall of blows to the head and body, obviously the target for a knockout blow, when he was saved from absorbing further and unnecessary punishment.

From the moment McLarnin dropped Leonard for a count of nine in the second round, with a right to the jaw, the outcome of this dramatic bout between the old time champion and the impetuous young Irishman, never hopes he will not have to use. was in doubt.
