A no-host luncheon will be served at noon and the afternoon session will begin with the executive session of the Salem Women's club at 1:30 o'clock.

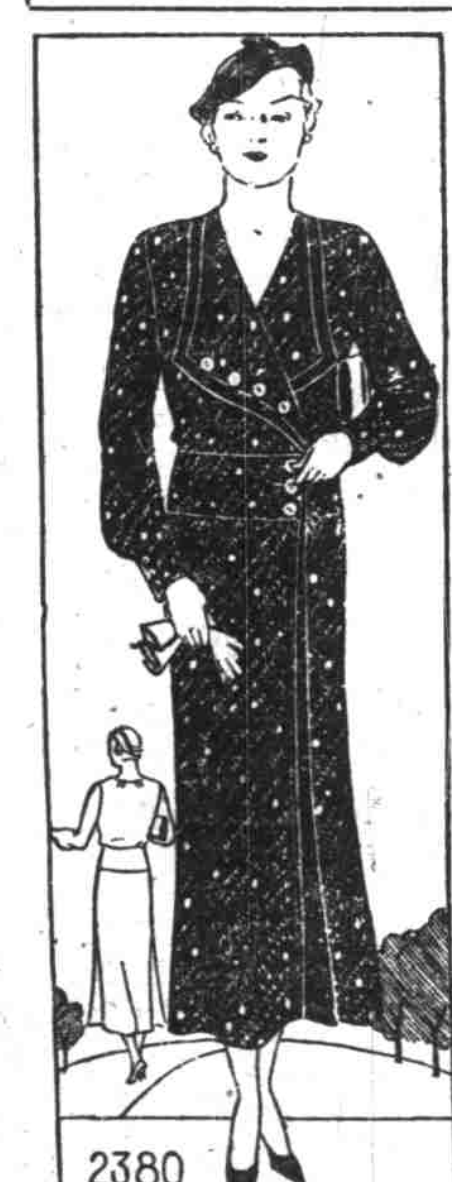
