pound on the maraschine product. or cherries candied, crystallized, or glaced, or preserved in any manner, with an additional charge of 40 per cent. ad valorem, is of course for the benefit of the maraschino manufacturers. It is enough. And Pacific coast growers are not now directly much interested. Indirectly, however, they are concerned, and they will not be found making any complaint, so long as the eastern manufacturers are prevented from success in their piggish attitude—the attitude they have exhibited in asking for themselves full protection, while fighting a reasonable rate for the growers.

Then, with continued republican success, or with the taking of the tariff out of politics, where it never belonged, most of the factories will finally be on this coast, near the raw supply, when the protection of that manufacturing line against ruinous foreign competition will greatly concern the people west of the Rockies. 5 5 5

The cherry growers of the Salem district and of other sections on this coast went through several bitter and expensive fights in securing the favorable protective rates that now prevail, against the fierce opposition of the eastern junta of maraschino manufactur-

Besides that, the maraschine barons took the matter into the courts, on the technicality involved in the higher rate on pitted cherries in brine. And lately they went before the tariff commission. asking for a downward revision under the flexible clauses of the Hawley-Smoot tariff. These are looked.

And they are important. They Y. M. C. A. show that the selfish maraschine makers have no concern for American growers. The tariff commission denied the latest petition for a downward revision of tariff rates. But the selfish junta will certainly be on the job in case of a democratic victory. They will want to hold Roosevelt and his crowd to their promises of lower tariff rates, for the benefit of our foreign trade.

As the matter now stands, if the ground gained can be held, we may look forward to securing new maraschino plants on this coast. But our growers will surely be confronted with the necessity for a renewed struggle, in case of a democratic victory next month And it may be a losing battle, with a democratic administration at Washington.

Mr. Kelly showed in his article that the preparation of the barrel cherry crop of Oregon (in sulphur and brine), on the basis of the last harvest, represents \$5,000 working days for women. And that is small, compared to what may come to pass in the future, under normal conditions, and with protective rates in the custom houses.


