## Brilliant Program Of Music to be Given Soon

The "A Capella" choir of the First Presbyterian church of Portland, with 40 voices, is being prepared in concert by the choir of the local Presbyterian church on Monday night, October 24, at 8:15 o'clock.

It comes from a church which has placed great emphasis on the development of musical talent among its members and which employs four persons for that purpose. Two of these, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence L. Faris, are graduates of the Westminster choir school. They devote their full time to the five choruses which they direct. These include persons of various ages from nine years up.

Members of the "A Capella" choir must be trained soloists. They must rehearse twice with the choir and take two voice lessons each in such rigorous requirements and plenty of talent available, the choir has built up a reputation for exquisite rendition of sacred music. They sing for the most part without accompaniment.

To interest other churches in improving their musical programs, the choir is giving concerts in a number of nearby cities without financial gain. Tickets are being sold at a sum just large enough to cover incidental expenses. They may be obtained at Will's music store or from members of the local Presbyterian choir.
