DEPRESSION BLAMED FOR LAPSE



When a man's got a wife and child, and they're hungry—and he has no money—what is he to do? One answer is supplied in the confession of the two Brooklyn business men who are charged with kidnapping little Jackie Russell, son of a wealthy Brooklyn broker, last month. The men, George Clark, insurance collector, and his employer, Allen August, told police, when they were arrested after brilliant detective work, that the depression had ruined their business and they were desperate for money. Both men are fathers of sons about little Jackie's age, so it is difficult to understand how they could bring themselves to cause such anguish to other parents. They kidnapped the boy as he was on his way from school and sent a ransom demand for \$25,000 to his parents. When this was refused they dropped to \$2,000, but that, too, was turned down. Then when the case caused a terrific furor in the newspapers the amateur kidnapers freed the boy, after holding him for eleven hours. Jackie spoke well of the men, asserting they were kind to him, having bought him candy, "funny papers" and told him stories. A slim clue supplied by the boy helped in the arrest of his abductors. From the window of the room where he had been imprisoned, Jackie had noticed a tent in a vacant lot. It was through this tent that the men were finally traced.

ASKS PROBE



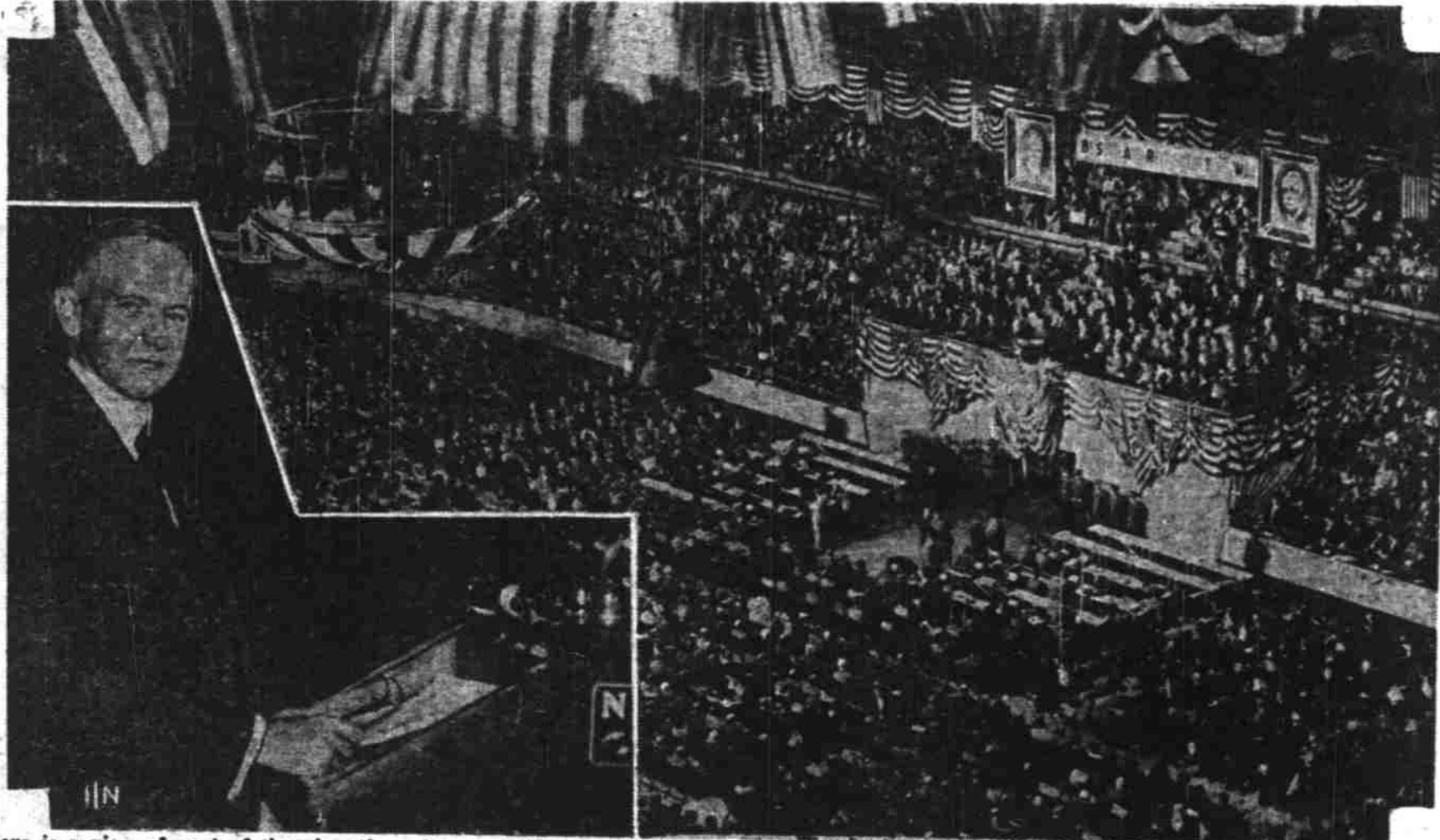

THRONG HEARS COOLIDGE BREAK SILENCE TO SUPPORT HOOVER



Here is a view of part of the gigantic audience of 18,000 people who jammed Madison Square Garden, New York, to hear former President Calvin Coolidge break his long silence and issue a spirited defense of the Hoover Administration. The former President pleaded for the re-election of the man who succeeded him as Chief Executive of the nation, asserting that but for the "leadership of President Hoover" in protecting the nation's credit system, conditions "would have been much worse." Many thousands who were unsuccessful in gaining admittance to the famous auditorium jammed nearby streets. Mr. Coolidge's address was broadcast over a nation-wide radio network. It was "Silent Cal's" first political speech since 1929. Inset is a fine close-up of the former President as he spoke into a battery of microphones.

LENIN-MADE LAUNDRYMAN



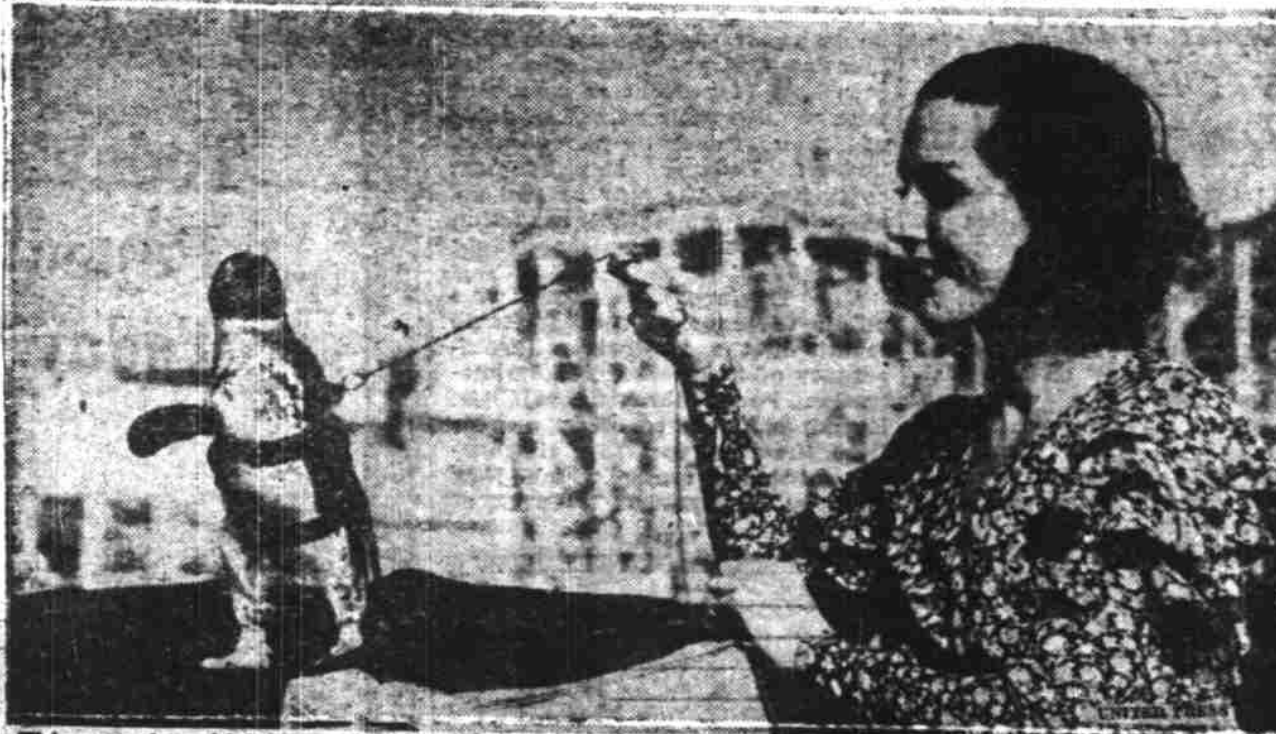

ousting of Prelate Eyed



Coming as an aftermath of the recent encyclical, issued to Mexican Catholics by Pope Pius XI, the expulsion of Archbishop Leopoldo Ruiz y Flores, Apostolic Delegate, from his native land, threatens to revive the bitter Church-State controversy that was temporarily adjusted in 1929 by the mediation of the late Dwight W. Morrow, then U. S. Ambassador to Mexico. The encyclical, which protested against the laws limiting the number of priests permitted to officiate in Mexico, while advising Catholics to cooperate with the government, drew a warning from President Abelardo Rodriguez that all Catholic churches would be turned into schools and shops if the "insolent, defiant attitude" shown in the encyclical continued. While the Vatican asserts that the papal resentment of Catholics may develop into armed rebellion, this belief is evidenced by the action of former President Elias Calles, still regarded as Mexico's strong man, who has offered his services to the late in Laredo, Texas, having been flown from Mexico City to the state capital.
