

### 39 VOCATIONAL LEADERS MEET

In Banquet at Silverton; Next Meeting to be Held at Eugene

SILVERTON, Oct. 27.—Thirty-nine instructors attended the Willamette Valley Vocational Instructors banquet held at Silverton Wednesday night. George Pimentel of Albany presided and

Ralph Morgan, also of Albany, acted as secretary. The welcome was made by Robert Goetz, superintendent of Silverton schools, who also spoke on the importance of the vocational education in the high school and of the demands made upon this department. Herman Cramer, principal of the senior high school here and P. J. Roubal, principal of the junior high school, both spoke briefly. G. A. Guderian of Salem reported on the joint Oregon-Washington trade and industrial conference held last summer. Mr. Pimentel recommended that this association join the American Vocational association and thus show a professional interest in the work. Delegates chosen to the O. S.

T. A. are O. D. Adams, state director of vocational education and T. T. McKensie, vocational director of the Salem high school. Next Meet at Eugene. Prof. George Cox of Oregon State college, reported on the program and plans for the Vocational Education department of the Oregon State Teachers association. It was voted to hold the next meeting of the Willamette Valley vocational association at Eugene on December 7 and the program will be arranged by the Salem group. Following the banquet the group retired to the class rooms of the local Smith-Eugene department where five reels of motion pictures were shown by O. D. McKensie and Martin Johnson of Eugene. Two of these were taken in the Nash Motor factory and showed the invention of a Medford boy—a highly compressed machine which blows the sand into the forms. Prof. Ridenhour of O. S. C. was present and explained the films.

### MANY OFFENDERS COME BEFORE COOK

WEST SALEM, Oct. 27.—Some of the recent legal cases on the docket for the West Salem justice court, with hearings given by Judge Elmer D. Cook are those of Elmer Tom and Richard Kefter, who were arraigned on charges of improper auto license plates, and ordered to procure the right ones and their cars held until they had their licenses. Robert Hunsaker, charged with improper plates was arraigned and his case is still pending. John Reed, arrested on a liquor charge was fined \$50; Wilbur Lewis arrested on a charge of disorderly conduct was fined \$10 and Robert Adams, arrested on the charge of possession was fined \$100, and all three are serving time now in jail.

Kenneth Williams of Tillamook charged with being drunk on a public highway, was fined \$100 and costs. His brother Robert, driver of the car featuring in a fatal accident said to have resulted from the effects of drinking, is on trial in Dallas.

Elmer Thornton, arrested on a charge of disorderly conduct, was fined \$15.00. H. E. Burns was arrested on the charge of assault and battery. George Aschenbrenner, also was arrested on the

charge of assault and battery. The case of Kenneth Barret, who was charged with excessive speed driving a truck 48 miles an hour, is still pending.

### Musical is Promised as Library Aid

SILVERTON, Oct. 27.—Through the courtesy of Prof. Hal Campbell, director of music in the Silverton schools, a library-benefit musical is being arranged at the Eugene Field auditorium for November 4. An excellent program is being arranged under the direction of Prof. Campbell who is heading several successful musical organizations at Silverton and surrounding community.

Prof. Campbell reports that he hopes to have his high school band, which won so much fame last spring, his newly organized symphony orchestra and perhaps the male chorus from Monitor, which he is now directing, appear for the library benefit.

"I think," said Mr. Campbell, "that the library is filling a real need here. I hope that it will grow and it will be a great pleasure for me to assist by arranging a musical for its benefit." Prof. Campbell has donated many volumes from his own library to the public library.

The primary purpose of this musical will be to bring out books. But should anyone not having a book to spare, wish to attend the concert, he or she will be welcome. The concert is free. Mr. Campbell just asks that those who have books to spare bring them to the Eugene Field auditorium that night. They will be turned over to the public library. Mrs. H. B.
