## In the days when Claude Gatch It's No Time to Change Leaders, Capper Asserts

MT. VERNON, Ohio, Nov. 1 come have almost a life and death importance for us all," Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas, in a republican campaign address tonight called upon farmers of the middle west to support President Hoover for reelection.

No new change is mr le in the \$1000 salary of the pufice matron, which the budget committee reduced from \$1320.


### Students Pungle Up on Saturday
