FRONIER, Nov. 3.—Mr. and Mrs. Howard Coy and son moved the first of the week into their new home which they recently built.

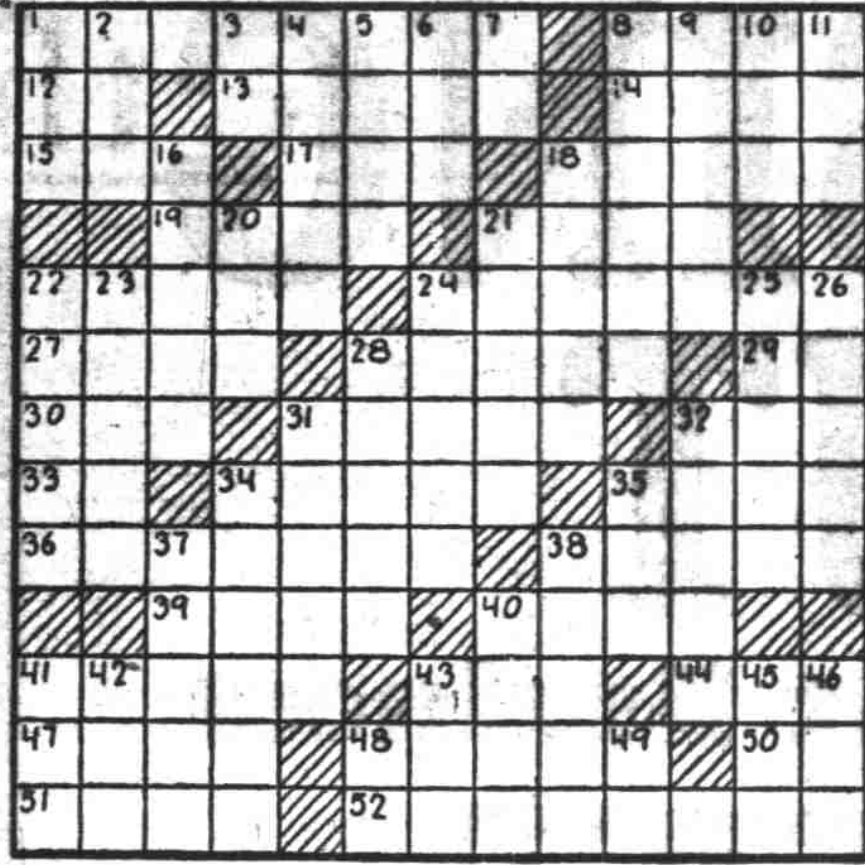
Reece Robbins who has been here since May returned to his home at Pasadena, Calif. He expects to return again in the spring with his family.

GOLD MINE STOCK GLEAM BRIGHTEST

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Stocks arrived at something of a compromise in the late market today after a desultory sag during most of another slow session. Closing price changes were irregular. Wheat's descent to fresh lows had much less effect than on other recent occasions, and stocks' ability to hold above the average October 19 lows was open to favorable interpretation, although just how strong the resistance really was, could hardly be determined in a turnover of only 1,921,180 shares.

Gold mining issues gleamed brightly. This group made one of those periodic sallies that frequently follow declining commodity prices. Homestake was the headline, climbing to a record high of 15 1/2 and closing 1 1/2 points to the good. McIntyre, Fecupine, Alaska Juneau and Dome also participated in the move, although unrespectably.
