Estate of Fake Totals \$48,700, Executor Shows

The net estate of the late Charles H. Fake, available for distribution, is \$48,700, George Fake, executor, reported to the probate court Thursday. A principal item in the property is four \$10,000 Liberty bonds.

A life interest in the estate aside from minor bequests is left to Marie M. Fake. At her death the children share in the estate in the following proportions: George Fake 12 per cent; Sophia Fake-Donnell, 12 per cent; Sarah Fake-Smith, 12 per cent; Mary Fake, 25 per cent; Lida Fake-Brown 17 per cent; Nell Fake-Lybecker, 17 per cent. The last two bequests are to be trusts, the income from which goes to the beneficiaries.

Book 88 Years Overdue Sent Back, Library

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Fincleat week at the Cambridge public library today resulted in the return by John Mackintosh of a book, "The Story of Scotland," 88 years overdue. Fines on the book, which originally cost the library 65 cents in 1890, would have amounted to \$290—the sum the borrower escaped paying by virtue of the cancellation offer.
