F. O. B. apple prices have shown little change during the past two weeks although selling inquiry declined, probably as a result of heavy unsold, loadings last week. A flood of third grade stock was received in California via boat from the northwest, mostly on consignment; and stopped f. o. b. inquiry from that sector. Demand for the cheap crates or lugs of Washington third grade apples, which was quite active a month ago, has become very quiet.
