

ROOSEVELT HAS SAFE MAJORITY

Lead Over 11,000 With Only Seven Counties Giving Hoover Approval

(Continued from page 1) In 146 precincts the vote was Butler 4,736 and Pierce 5,195. Butler had been leading throughout the early reports, but Pierce jumped suddenly to the front in the last tabulation.

In the third congressional district Representative C. H. Martin, democrat, led Homer D. Angell, R., in 65 precincts the vote was Martin 20,413; Angell, 11,991.

Portland, Nov. 8.—(AP)—As reports continued to pour in from all parts of the state Franklin D. Roosevelt was increasing his lead over President Hoover for Oregon's five electoral votes.

James W. Mott was more than 3,000 votes ahead of Harvey Starkweather, democrat, for United States representative from the first congressional district. The vote in 97 precincts stood: Mott, 3,558; Starkweather, 6,024.

In the second congressional district Representative R. R. Butler, republican, was leading Walter B. Gleason, democrat, in 215 precincts in the third congressional district, was leading Homer D. Angell, 8,375 to 11,000.

Next President Supported Here (Continued from page 1) Frederick Steiwer was leading Democrat Walter B. Gleason, 5711 to 4061. Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, was far ahead of the republican ticket, outdistancing Ray Wisecarver, democrat, 6424 to 3728. James W. Mott, Salem resident, was easily leading Harvey G. Starkweather, democrat, in their race for congressman in the first district. Mott had 5334 and Starkweather 4494. Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, was considerably behind J. W. Maloney, democrat, in Marion county. On the basis of 51 precincts, part complete and part incomplete, Maloney had 5725 and Holman 4440. L. H. VanWinkle, attorney-general, led the republican ticket in his county. His vote count at 1:30 a. m. was 7630 to Dobson's 1300. A. C. Burk has apparently owned Sheriff Oscar Bower on the face of the 1:30 a. m. returns. Burk's total then was 5983 to Bower's 4409. The defeat of Bower was considered an upset in local politics as Bower was well-known. He had served 12 years as sheriff. Burk was supported by the Christian Federation of the county. William Trindle was easily elected district attorney. He polled 5787 votes on the returns at 1:30 a. m. to 2:30 for Victor R. Fages, independent, and 1794 for James W. Eckersley, also an independent. Chief Justice Bean was fairly well ahead in the county in his race to be re-elected. He had 4981 to 3811 for Roy B. Howitt, for circuit judge. L. G. Lewelling, incumbent, was leading 2 to 1 over M. Inman. The former's vote was 4624, the latter's 2346.

(Continued from page 1) Incomplete returns. A total of 7638 voters cast their ballots for the truck bill with 3235 opposed. The Rogee river closing bill fared worse with a vote of 4893 for and 8487 against. Latest returns showing a cross section of sentiment in all parts of the county showed that the bill providing for a tax of 10 cents a pound on oleomargarine manufactured and sold in the state of Oregon, apparently was losing by a substantial majority. The vote for this bill was 5646 with 7903 opposed. The so-called income tax measure fared well in the rural districts, with a small adverse vote being cast in some of the Salem precincts. This measure had the support of virtually all rural organizations, and was endorsed by Governor Meier. The administration measure providing for the reason of tax supervising bodies in all counties in Oregon, also was favored by the voters based on incomplete returns. There were 11,467 votes cast in favor of this measure and 7405 against. Another administration measure providing for tax aid debt control, was running behind by a vote

DEFEAT CONCEDED EARLY BY G. O. P.

(By The Associated Press) Pyramiding majorities for Roosevelt and Garner in Tuesday's election a smothered republican hopes for Hoover and Curtis so deeply that some concessions of defeat were announced even before all the states had reported. Democratic figures bounding upwards in strategic New York led the Hoover manager there to give up the state. The Republican Daily News of Chicago and New York Herald Tribune conceded the nation as well. Returns showed a close vote on the water power amendment. This bill lost heavily in many of the Salem precincts but apparently met with favor in the rural districts. A total of 6496 voters were cast for this measure with 5922 against. The voters also went on record favoring repeal of the 1931 legislation appropriation for the support of the higher institutions of learning. On the face of early returns, 11,335 voters cast their ballots for the repeal of this appropriation. Voting for the proposition were 1903. The measure providing for property qualifications for persons voting on bills carrying tax levies and bonds had received an affirmative vote of 11,956, with 5432 opposed. The measure allowing persons accused of crime to be tried without a jury also received a favorable vote. A total of 7755 voters approved this measure, with 4905 against. Another measure having to do with the 6 per cent limitation amendment was approved, based on incomplete returns. The vote for this measure was 6205, with 5344 opposed. Because of the large ballot and heavy vote some of the counting boards probably will not complete their work before noon today. More than 50 per cent of the population of the state of Wisconsin is licensed to drive automobiles.

(Continued from page 1) the income tax measure and the hydro-electric bill. Early returns were not tabulated on the remaining six measures passed upon today. PORTLAND, Nov. 8.—(AP)—By an almost five to one vote, early returns tonight went against the university moving bill. Incomplete returns from eight counties, exclusive of the counties to be affected by the measure, all went heavily against the measure. Seven up-state counties showed an almost two to one vote against the repeal of the state prohibition law. Including 52 precincts in Multnomah county, the 66 districts out of 1,738 in the state returned 979 votes for the school moving bill while 4,643 votes were cast against it. Counties heard from also included Clackamas, Columbia, Deschutes, Douglas, Linn, Marion and Morrow. The most decisive early vote against the bill was in Deschutes county where two precincts voted better than 11 to one against moving the university from Eugene to Corvallis. Exclusive of Multnomah county, where early returns on all state measures had not been compiled, the vote against the repeal of the Oregon dry law stood 1020 for and 1869 against. Clackamas, Columbia, Douglas and Marion counties gave slight leads for the repeal, while Linn and Morrow counties were more decisive against the repeal. The freight and truck bus bill passage was trailing in the returns from 62 precincts in the state, including Multnomah county, with 2234 in favor and 3455 against. There was less than 150 votes difference in the Multnomah returns against the bill. Up-state votes from 10 precincts on other important measures submitted to the Oregon electorate today gave 659 for the tax on oleomargarine to 796 against; 652 in favor of closing the Rogee river to commercial fishing to 952 against; 661 for the income tax bill against 743 opposed, and 571 for the water power and hydro-electric constitutional amendment to 785 against.

Idaho Trend to Demo Side Big

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Democracy marched into almost certain control in Idaho in the wake of the Roosevelt landslide. Reports from more than a third of the expected vote gave every democratic candidate a lead, from president down. The vote for Governor Roosevelt was 27,554 against 15,816 for President Hoover on 135 of the 819 precincts in the state.
