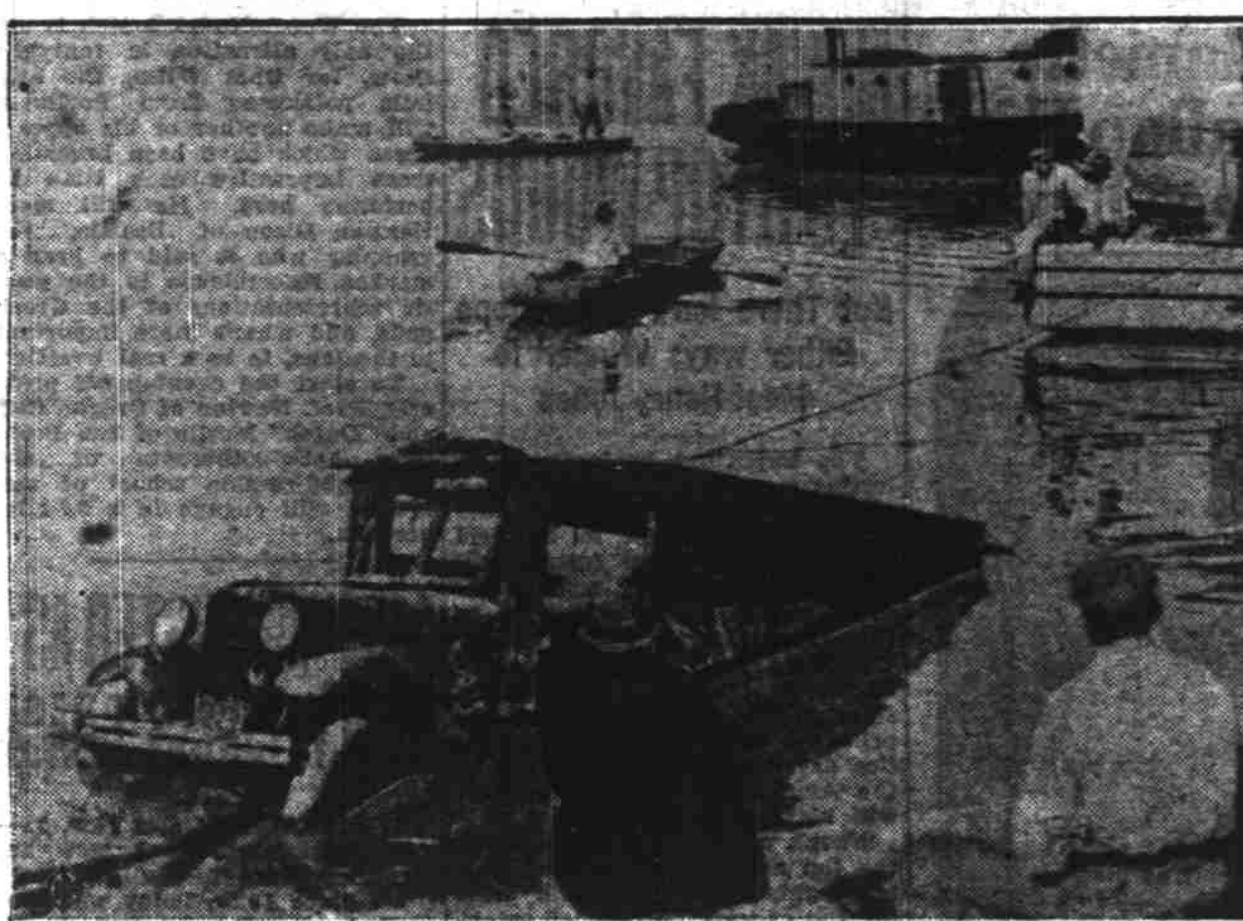

# Tax Commission Is Satisfied With Income's Result

Members of the state tax commission expressed satisfaction yesterday when late returns from the general election indicated that the personal income tax law amendment had been approved by the voters.

This amendment would increase the maximum rate on incomes to eight per cent, and reduce materially certain exemptions allowed under the present act.

The tax commissioners admitted that approval of the amendment would increase the tax burden in Oregon approximately \$500,000 annually.
