WEBFEET HOPE FOR BIG UPSET

Collison's Team in Best of Shape; Orangemen to Start Eastward

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 9.—(AP) Frankly hopeful of turning an upset that might well be the nation's football gossip hotpoint of the day, the University of Oregon Webfeet turned in a hard practice here today in anticipation of their Pacific coast conference struggle Saturday with the Trojans of University of Southern California. The game will be at Los Angeles.

Assured that Mike Mikulak, the splintering fullback who is equally strong on defense, and Stan Kostka, halfback particularly valuable offensively, would be in shape for the game, the Webfeet were working to bear out the prediction of Coach James Schlar of Washington University that either Oregon or Washington would defeat the Trojans. The Webfeet favored Oregon for the week.

Temple, whose sensational 65-0 return of a punt for a touchdown gave Oregon its victory over Oregon State college last week, will also be in the backfield. The line has proved strong enough to hold against all coast conference teams Oregon has played so far, except U. C. L. A. and the Bears resorted to the air for their victory.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Thirty-one Orangemen from Oregon State college will entrain tomorrow with Coach Paul J. Schisler for football invasion of the east, as far as New York. They will play three games before returning to their home field.

On the way east they will stop at Misoula, where they will play the University of Montana in their final Pacific coast conference game of the season Saturday.

From there the Orangemen will go to New York, to play Fordham university, the team that routed St. Mary's in a sensational upset last week.

The last of the three games will be at Detroit with Detroit university on Thanksgiving day. The team is expected back here November 25.

The game with Montana is expected to determine basement position for the coast conference. Whether school has won a conference game this season.

Son of Famous Willamette Quarterback to Gallop For Eugene High Here Friday

An older generation of football fans in Salem, as well as all of the current generation, will find something of particular interest in the Salem-Eugene high school football game at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon on Olinger field.

For the son of Herb Owen, who galloped on one of Willamette university's great football teams as a quarterback away back in 1906, will attempt to do some galloping for Eugene high, while Salem's warriors seek to prevent him from galloping too far.

The son is Elton Owen, and he is also a quarterback and without any doubt a "chip off the old block" who will remind those fans who have lived here since 1906 and top in northwest circles, of his dad. Elton weighs only 155 pounds but plays a hard, aggressive game at all times and was a big factor in Eugene's victory over Corvallis last week.

Herb Owen in 1906 played on the Willamette team which defeated Oregon State—O. A. C. then if anybody insists—4 to 0 after holding the University of Washington to a scoreless tie. O. A. C. had beaten Oregon, so that placed Willamette right up in the top in northwest circles.

The elder Owen is now the wrestling and boxing promoter at Eugene and is active in a similar field in Portland at present.

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NOVAK FAVORED TO STOP WOODS

But There Isn't Much Dope Either way; Winner to Meet Henry Jones

The important business of selecting a welterweight title match opponent for Henry Jones, said championship match to be held in Salem in the near future, will be concluded at the armory tonight when Bobby Novak of Cleveland, Ohio, and "Curly" Woods of Centralia, Wash., meet in the final event of a grappling show which will be one of the principal features of the Armistice day celebration conducted by the American Legion. The show will start at 9 o'clock.

Novak who is rated right up at the top among middle weight terweights and who came west for the express purpose of catching up with Jones and taking from him the belt Jones acquired here last summer by defeating Robba Reed, is considered by many fans to have an edge over Woods.

This is partly due to the fact that Novak has gone straight through the tournament unbeaten up to this point, whereas Woods was given a second chance after losing one match to Novak. However, Woods has come through impressively after that one defeat; and it was one of those indecisive affairs which give little indication of the participants' actual comparative ability.

Figure-Four Hold is Factor in Forecasts. Aside from that match which went in Novak's favor, however, the fans are pointing to his always decisive, if and when acquired, figure-four scissors hold. Opponents have arrived at the place where they found Novak has clamped one leg around the other with the opponent's mid-section in between. It can't be broken and it can't be endured.

Novak speaks of Woods as just as fast; they go after each other with everything in the book and considerable main strength and flying elbows as well, though their wrestling is clean.

M'EWAN OUSTED AS HOLY CROSS COACH

WORCESTER, Mass., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Captain John J. McEwan, head coach of football at Holy Cross since 1930, today was suspended as coach by Rev. T. J. Phelan, moderator of athletics. In the notice of suspension, Father Phelan gave "interference with the proper working of our athletic department by an unauthorized attempt to discharge one of our staff" as the cause of McEwan's being suspended.

The "published attempt to discharge one of our staff" related to Captain McEwan's argument with Bart Sullivan, trainer, during the Brown game at Providence. Rumors of disension spread after the game, which Holy Cross lost in the final minutes of play, 10 to 7, and Captain McEwan was quoted as saying Sullivan had openly mutinied, and could no longer act as trainer for the football squad.

Captain McEwan said he had "nothing to say whatever." It was learned from reliable sources that Arthur E. "Bunny" Brown, who has been end coach for the past year, will take charge of the squad.

LESLIE-PARRISH TILT BIG EVENT

Teams Well Matched, Fans Showing Avid Interest in Final Outcome

There is little in the season records to indicate which way the battle will go. Oregon City junior high was the one common opponent, and Leslie scored a more decisive victory over that school than did Parrish; but fans who saw Oregon City play here were generally of the opinion that the boys from down river must have received reinforcements before coming here, and after playing Leslie.

In addition to this mitigating consideration, there is the further one that last year Leslie was the favorite from exactly the same cause, a better showing against Oregon City, but Parrish pulled out a victory in the city title contest, 13 to 10.

Though both teams are considerably lighter than last year, Parrish is believed to have a slight advantage in weight. It is claimed, on the other hand, that Leslie's backfield is a little faster and that its plays are well adapted to take advantage of that speed.

The rival squads are "hopped up" for tonight's game and it is safe to predict that the game will be a terrific battle, no matter what the outcome.

LESLIE-PARRISH TILT BIG EVENT

Teams Well Matched, Fans Showing Avid Interest in Final Outcome

The big event of the year for about 1200 of Salem's young people, and an extremely important event for many others, will take place under the floodlights on Sweetland field tonight at 7 o'clock when the football teams of Parrish and Leslie junior high schools engage in their annual battle for the city championship. The game will be the first event of the American Legion's Armistice celebration.

Student groups at both institutions are all fired up over the annual clash—those at Leslie perhaps a little more than those at Parrish, because this is a game Leslie has never won and "hope springs eternal."

But on top of that, an increasing proportion of Salem's general public has become aware that the junior high schools develop some hard fighting and well considered athletic teams whose contests are well worth watching, and the two sections of the city have developed considerable rivalry, residents of each district backing the school which draws students from their neighborhood.

Parrish and Leslie started "from scratch" this year, each with just one regular from last year's team, and that veteran in each case is the quarterback and chief ball carrier—the latter from necessity because the two have not had the privilege of calling signals. They are Salstrom at Parrish and Stables at Leslie. Their private duel will be one of the highlights

BULLDOGS EXPECT TOUGHTEST BATTLE

WOODBURN, Nov. 9.—Woodburn high school's football team participates in one of the hardest games on its schedule this season when the Bulldogs journey to McMinnville Friday morning to exchange pleasantries with the Mac high Grizzlies. The football machine representing McMinnville this year is virtually the same outfit that Coach Allison had on hand last year when the Grizzlies made a bid for state championship honors. Although graduation took its toll of the team, a number of veterans have returned to the team this year.

Glenn Odde, coach for Woodburn, is hoping that the McMinnville field will be comparatively dry, as his team, outwheeled by the opponents, will have a much better advantage if such is the case.

For the first time in several weeks no regulars are on the sick list. The entire first string backfield of Gearin, Boyle, Skiller and Halter will be functioning. The forward wall will be the same that started in the Molalla game, with the Koch brothers at ends, Courtney and Larson tackles, Pavelok and Conyne guards, and Block center.

AMONG the colorful stars now coveting on the grid-iron, attention should be called to three Hawaiian footballers, each of whom has made a name for himself as a pigskin toter.

One of them, by the name of Gordon Chung Hoon, is the spearhead of the Navy attack this year; another, who sports the Irish moniker of "Mickey" McGuire, is doing a fine job of halfbacking for Wisconsin's Badgers; while the third is Henry "Honolulu" Hughes, former Oregon halfback, who is now playing for the Boston Braves' professional grid outfit.

As far as I know, Hughes was the first of the Hawaiians to pull the barefoot kicking gag. He used to boot the pigskin great distances with his bare toes when he was playing with the Oregon team three or four years back, and he is still pulling the same trick among the pros.

Shees are just an annoyance to Henry, who learned the trick of punning barefooted back in dear old Honolulu.

Mickey McGuire, Wisconsin's Hawaiian pride, can also kick the pigskin when minus his shoes, and claims that he is able to boot a football fifty yards barefooted; and like Hughes, he learned the art in Hawaii.

Now for Mr. Chung Hoon, of the Navy, who has not yet claimed the distinction of being a barefooted punter; or if he has, I haven't heard of it. Chung Hoon specializes in forward passing rather than punting, although he is no slouch at kicking the pigskin at that.

He is a real triple threat, with natural football talent and an instinctive ability to do the right thing at the right time. A tricky and clever ball carrier, a fine forward passer and a good punter, he has been the spark plug of the Midles' offense this season.
