

# Once More Marx Brothers Arrive

## MULE KICKS MARX QUARTET TO FAME

### "Horse Feathers" Latest of Their Foolish Vehicles, At Elsinore Today

A bad-tempered Texas mule, long dead, practically kicked the Four Marx Brothers from Class D vaudeville into fame and fortune.

The quartet of insane comedians, whose latest picture, "Horse Feathers," comes to the Elsinore theater today, admit that the quadruped's nasty disposition was chiefly responsible for showing them the way from obscurity to success.

A small town in Texas was the scene. The brothers, in an act made up principally of classical music, were playing in a cheap vaudeville house. Weeks of struggle to live, eat, and pay their traveling expenses out of a ridiculously small salary, coupled with the fact that their act was meeting with very indifferent success, frayed their nerves and sickened them at heart.

And when, during their act, a mule ran away outside the theater and smashed up a store, and the whole audience, learning what was going on, got up in a body and went out to enjoy the spectacle, all the pent-up disgust inside them exploded with a loud "bang."

When the audience returned, it was to find the four dispensers of classical music burlesquing their own act. The audience looked on in amazement for a moment, and then burst forth in applause. They liked it!

But it was not until a few weeks later, and after a few more discouragements, that the Marx Brothers decided definitely to give themselves up to insanity. In Brownsville, Texas, broke and unhappy, they went on the stage in a thoroughly miserable frame of mind, not caring whether or not they would get through the act. With a vengeance they went about the business of burlesque. It was mad, thoroughly senseless, and the audience, stunned by the rapid developments, held its breath.

As the act ended, the Marx Brothers dashed to their dressing room, conscious of a roar from the auditorium behind them, but caring about it not at all. Soon came a knock at their door.

"All right," called Groucho. "We're packing."

"Packing, my eye," came the manager's voice. "You've got to come out and take these curtain calls. You've stopped the show; the audience won't let the next act go on."

And that was the last sane moment any of the brothers ever enjoyed. They had learned.

"Horse Feathers," directed by Norman McLeod, is said to be wilder and funnier than any of their previous musical comedy or picture efforts.
