## RETURNS ARE FILED BY SEVEN COUNTIES

Returns from seven counties in Tuesday's election were received at the state department here Saturday and the official canvass will get under way early this week. Because of the heavy vote cast at the election it probably will require three weeks to complete the official canvass and issue the formal election proclamation.

## MOTOR TAX CUT IS DEEMED PROBABLE

Reduction of motor vehicle fees and increase in the gasoline fuels tax are two important problems that are certain to come before the 1933 legislature, according to legislators who were in Salem Saturday.

Some of the legislators were said to favor a reduction of 50 per cent in motor vehicle fees, while others declare that a cut of 33 1-3 per cent would be sufficient. Still others were said to favor a flat license fee of \$5 a year. Virtually all of the legislators were agreed that in event of a drastic cut it would be necessary to increase the gasoline fuels tax by at least one cent a gallon.

Leslie M. Scott, chairman of the state highway commission, declared in an address here recently that any reduction beyond 33 1-3 per cent in motor vehicle fees would play havoc with the highway construction program in all sections of the state. He indicated that a cut of 33 1-3 per cent would not be disastrous, providing that the gasoline fuels tax was increased.

None of the hold-over legislators were said to favor a flat license fee of \$5, although some of those elected last Tuesday were reported to be pledged to such a program.

Several letters have been received in Salem recently asking for information regarding the state highway construction program, as it affects present and future finances.

## Widow of Auto's Victim Suing for \$10,000 Damages

Damages of \$10,000 are sought from Lloyd Johnson in a suit filed in circuit court Saturday by Josephine Smith, administratrix of the estate of the late Clarence Smith. She alleges that he died from injuries received September 10, 1932, when he was struck by an auto driven by Johnson. Smith was a pedestrian on the south Pacific highway and was walking near the Catholic cemetery when he was hit by Johnson's car which was going north. The administratrix says the plaintiff was capable

of receiving \$75 a month for his work and at the age of 55 years had a normal expectancy of earning \$10,000 during the remainder of his years.

## Employment Here Nears Standstill

Activities at the U.S. - Y.M.C.A. employment bureau here came almost to a standstill last week and only 18 persons were sent to work, in contrast with 40 the week before. Of those placed 16 were men and two women.
