

TAX PROBLEMS GET LIMELIGHT

Levy on Property Followed By Substitute in Form Of Sales Tax, Plan

ever the federal government sales taxes are all added to the purchaser's charges, the proposed state tax would be a charge directly against all gross sales and would be paid for by the companies without passing the charge on to customers.

The estimate on retail sales, exclusive of utilities, comes from 1929 retail sales in Oregon as shown by federal census statistics. That year the net retail sales in Oregon were \$460,000,000. Assuming these are now 60 per cent of that amount, \$276,000,000 will be sold in 1933.

Cutting Expenses
Favored in Discussion
Various new taxes were being talked yesterday, certain business men were declaring that the way to avoid taxes, property and sales together, was to cut expenses. They declared that the state should conduct its business more economically, and that the state should cut its expenses.

Budget Director Hansen said yesterday that cut as deeply as he could in the 1933-1934 budget, he would scarcely be able to balance the budget without new revenue. He said the state taxes of four mills eliminated for 1932 were not restored.

Hansen is considering the continuing appropriations for state higher education as a possible source for new revenue. He has in mind some possible reduction of the subsidies the state has given for child welfare in former years.

The demand for a sales tax and against a property tax comes from farm and home owners who found property tax levies confiscatory in the last two years. It also comes from many counties in the state such as Klamath, Union, Wallowa, Umatilla and Coos where warrant indebtedness is mounting.

Robert E. Reynolds, wet Democrat, who defeated J. F. Newell, dry Republican, in the race for U. S. Senator from North Carolina. Reynolds was elected for the full term, ending March, 1933. His colleague in the Upper House is Senator J. W. Bailey, also a Democrat.

\$25,000 JUDGMENT UPHELD BY COURT

The state supreme court, in an opinion written by Justice Rossman, Tuesday affirmed the decree of Judge H. K. Zimmerman of the Clatsop county circuit court, in a suit brought by Anna Nordlund, widow of John Nordlund, to recover damages from the Lewis & Clark Railroad company. The lower court awarded Mrs. Nordlund a judgment in the amount of \$25,000.

Nordlund was killed when the front wheels of a truck upon which he was performing his duties as a brakeman jumped from the rails and threw him and its load of logs into a ditch alongside of the railroad tracks. Evidence introduced at the trial in the circuit court indicated that the ties at the place of the accident were rotten and that a number of the spikes had worked loose from the flange of the rail. Other negligence also was charged to the railroad company.

In another opinion the supreme court affirmed the decree of Judge W. A. Ekwall, of the Multnomah county circuit court in an action for damages filed by Edward Fitzgerald against the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company. Fitzgerald obtained judgments for \$5000 in the lower court.

Large Audience Hears Converted Atheist's Talk

Before an audience of about 500 people, Martin S. Charles, until three months ago a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Atheism, told of his conversion to the Christian faith. According to pastor Weston of the Evangelist Tabernacle, where the meetings are being held, much interest was evidenced by the audience.

Ralph Underwood, a former "soap boxer" in the Atheist movement, will speak tonight concerning his conversion.

Both Charles and Underwood will tell of their own experiences with other atheists on Thursday night.

Fraternis Member Accused of Theft For Fake Trial

A misdemeanor subject to a fine of from \$25 to \$500 or to a 90 day to six month jail sentence, or both.

Judge McMahan, a pioneer, is eligible under the Oregon code to receive a license without charge. He possessed a 1931 license but did not have it renewed and had not obtained deer tags for 1932. These cannot be obtained without first securing a license and then making application for the tags.

Officials charged with enforcing the game laws said yesterday Judge McMahan in former years had delayed until the day of his hunting trip before writing about his license and then only to inform them he was going hunting and to request that they issue him a license pending his return.

Ruling on Moore Estate is Final; Rehearing Denied

Final determination of the much debated Moore estate's heirs was made yesterday when the state supreme court denied a rehearing of the case of Taylor against McMahan and Moore's nieces, living in New York state, were plaintiffs and respondents in the action, having been declared in circuit court here, to be Moore's heirs. The estate involved about \$55,000.

Moore died at Oregon City. Wait was first named administrator of his estate. Later Barry, an insurance salesman, was named executor and heir. The nieces upset Barry's and Wait's claim by setting forth a contract made between Moore and his wife, under which the nieces were to have final title to the property left by the Moores.

ROOSEVELT GRANTS FIRST INTERVIEWS

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 15—(AP)—Still in bed at the executive mansion, Franklin D. Roosevelt late today held his first press conference since Thursday, telling newspapermen he had been suffering from "a slight attack of the flu."

The president-elect was in good spirits and appeared nearly recovered from the illness with which he has been confined five days.

Sitting propped up in bed, clad in pajamas, a white sweater and an old purple dressing gown, Mr. Roosevelt greeted the correspondents with a grin.

"I have had a slight attack of the flu," he related, "and I ached all over, even to the top of my head but I feel alright now, although a little weak."

He refused to discuss national affairs or his forthcoming conference with President Hoover. He said "no further consideration" had been given the conference, and would not be given unless he was ready to leave for Warm Springs. His tentative schedule calls for departing early next week, possibly with a visit to a party at democratic national headquarters in New York Monday and arrival in Washington Tuesday.

COMMISSION SETS POLICE SENIORITY

Starting at once to put city police under civil service, as adopted by the voters a week ago Tuesday, the civil service commission yesterday received a list of officers employed on the local force and their date of entry into the department. 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MORTGAGE BURNING BRINGS OUT CROWD

Final Payment on Jason Lee Parsonage is a Big Event

Conclusion of seven years' effort in clearing the Jason Lee Methodist church parsonage of a mortgage was celebrated at the church last night by the largest dinner crowd ever accommodated there. It was estimated between 200 and 300 persons were present. The Ladies' Aid had charge of the pot luck dinner.

H. G. Humphreys, Jason Lee pastor, led community singing, the choir presented several selections and Miss Bernice Rickman sang a solo. Rev. Thomas Acheson, now pastor of Centenary Wilbur church, Portland, and formerly Jason Lee church here, was the main speaker. He told of a recent visit to Ireland. He was pastor here when the parsonage was constructed.

Representative of the building of the parsonage, on the program, were musical numbers by C. L. Slater.

C. M. Roberts, who directed the first building committee, in 1925, called upon P. L. Frazier, chairman of the board of trustees, now Mr. Frazier, who managed the church restaurant at the state fair, profits from which paid off the parsonage mortgage. Other members of the building committee were Harry Carpenter, Melvin Johnson, Mrs. L. H. Roberts, Mrs. P. L. Frazier, Mrs. A. F. Waller and Gordon Black.

Joseph Barber, secretary-treasurer, then suggested that the mortgage be burned since it had been paid off. Mr. Frazier, remarking that A. A. Lee had donated the land for the church and parsonage, directed Mrs. Frazier to touch a match to the mortgage.

The Jason Lee Men's Brotherhood arranged the program. The young people of the church assisted and Don Douris had charge of ushering.

INSULT TELLS OF FIRMS' FAILURES

CHICAGO, Nov. 15—(AP)—Samuel Insull Jr., 33-year-old son of the former utilities emperor, told in federal court today of the final desperate attempts to save two bankrupt Insull companies.

The younger Insull was president at \$70,000 a year salary of Insull Utilities Investments, Inc., and Corporation Securities company of Chicago.

Testifying with apparent anxiety for accuracy, young Insull recalled that in December 1931 "the point was reached where because of the declining securities markets the two companies were unable to continue posting additional collateral" for loans of millions of dollars from New York and Chicago banks.

Therefore, he said, he was instructed by his father and other Insull officials to negotiate with the banks for a "standstill" agreement under which they would demand no more collateral. In return, he said, he planned to make a "jackpot" of unpledged stock and assets of the companies as possible security for all the banks.

UTILITY DISTRICT VETOED, IS RULING

Although the electorate of Hood River county voted in favor of organizing a people's utility district at the recent general election, an adverse vote in the city of Hood River defeated the proposal, it was announced here Tuesday by C. E. Stricklin, secretary of the state hydro-electric commission.

The returns of the election show the 1158 votes were cast in the county favorable to creation of the district with 1104 opposed. In the city of Hood River the proposal was rejected by a vote of 450 to 238 against. Stricklin based his announcement on an opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle in connection with an attempt to create a people's utility district in Tillamook county. In the Tillamook election two parcels voted against creation of the district.

Attorney General VanWinkle held that in order to create a people's utility district all parcels involved in the election must vote favorably to the proposal.

Mrs. Cheney Asks \$7590 in Damages From Rosenthal

Damages of \$7590 are sought by Mrs. Elizabeth Cheney from William A. Rosenthal for injuries allegedly received from defendant's carelessness in operating an auto. Plaintiff claims she is permanently and seriously injured as a result of an auto collision with a car driven by Rosenthal July 3, 1932.

In the complaint filed Tuesday in circuit court here, plaintiff sets forth that she was riding north with Laura Cheney, driver, on the road to Tillamook, last summer. Rosenthal, driving 45 miles an hour, she claims, tried to pass them and in doing so struck the Cheney car, forcing it into the ditch and causing the plaintiff's severe injury.
