November Records for Cold Broken; Snow Extends South to Texas

covered the southeastern and south-central portions of the state. In Detroit, the weight of snow crushed a church roof. Northwestern Ohio Just One Snowdrift
Northwestern Ohio presented the appearance of an almost unbroken snowdrift. Many sections were snowbound, traffic paralyzed, with highway maintenance crews shoveling overtime. Toledo reported a fall of nine inches, the heaviest on record. Lima went into temporary hibernation under a 12-inch blanket. In Mercer county, the snow reached a height of 15 inches, rising temperatures were forecast for today.
The western Great Lakes region saw the vagaries of the weather do queer things to the mercury. Chicago's was a veritable oasis of warmth in a region of snow and ice. A "nor'easter" blowing in from the lake reached some sort of meteorological compromise with the icy blasts from the Yukon, kept the mercury above the freezing point while many points in Wisconsin and downstate Illinois shivered in near-zero temperatures.

POSTOFFICE UPSET IS QUESTION MARK

STAYTON, Nov. 16. — Along with the change in national politics comes the question, what, if any, change will be made in the local postoffice? Mrs. Emma Sloper Brown, republican, is serving her second term in this office and her appointment does not expire until 1934. Mrs. Brown was first appointed in 1926. Prior to that time she was acting postmaster, serving out the unexpired term of E. B. Watters.

While Mrs. Brown has always given courteous and efficient service, there is no doubt but what some democrat will aspire to the office. So far there are only rumors as to who are interested. At the time Harding was elected, E. D. Alexander, then postmaster-appointed under the Wilson administration, had served but one and one-half years on his second term. However, regardless of this fact, he was let out soon after Harding took office. Whether this will be the case among postmasters throughout the country after Governor Roosevelt takes office, remains to be seen.

repeal the dry laws. William A. Constock, incoming democratic governor, said he would, if legal, free imprisoned violators after his inauguration.
Indiana democrats, who will be in control of the legislature, have announced plans for early repeal of the Wright "bone dry" law, one of the strictest in the nation. They also planned for a state constitutional convention if congress voted to resubmit the prohibition issue to the states.
While several Ohio legislators have indicated they favored modification of state laws, Gov. George White, who favors modification, said that prior to repeal or amendment of the federal laws he would vote changes because "chaos and confusion" would follow. Ohio has constitutional prohibition.

of these provides that state senators shall be elected for a term of four years and representatives for a term of two years, from the day after the election.
A subsequent provision, while making no reference to senators and representatives, provides that state officers shall assume their duties on the second Monday in January following their election.
Gov. White accepted the first of the constitutional provisions.

HACKITT FUNERAL SLATED FOR TODAY

GERVAIS, Nov. 16. — Robert Hackitt, a resident of this section for the past 17 years, died at his home in Gervais at an early hour Tuesday morning. He was born in Aldrie, Scotland, January 4, 1857.

The family came to America when he was 15 years of age. They settled first in Pennsylvania, later working their way westward—residing in Illinois, South Dakota and eastern Washington, and coming to Oregon in 1918, where he and his sister, Miss Ellen, bought a farm near Brooks. They lived on the farm until a year ago, when they sold it and came to Brooks. He had been a farmer for 40 years, and was never married. Two brothers and two sisters survive, John of Seattle, Stewart of Des Moines, Cal., Miss Ellen of Gervais and Mrs. Anna Haslou of Mason City, Ia.
He was a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge of Coitax, Wash.
Funeral services will be held from the local Presbyterian church Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. H. L. Graffius officiating and burial will be at the Pioneer cemetery three miles south of Gervais.

are predatory animal eradication, alfalfa weevil control and the department of Americanization.
Hansen said he would recommend that all departments and activities now partly self supporting either curtail their expenditures to keep well within their revenues, or increase their fees so as to absorb their previous legislative appropriations.
Hansen to Defend His Recommendations
Although anticipating opposition from some of the departments whose appropriations have been disapproved, Hansen declared he was ready to appear before the legislature and argue for the adoption of his recommendations. He said the curtailment of these activities had received the approval of Governor Meier.
The amount of the savings, as listed by Hansen on a two year basis, follow:
World war veterans commission \$1,050,000; emergency board \$150,000; predatory animal eradication \$124,000; county agricultural fairs \$110,898; state board of health \$87,025; state engineer \$47,491; Oregon state fair \$76,090; Pacific International livestock exposition \$75,000; battleship Oregon \$30,000.
Public utilities commission \$27,947; bureau of labor \$24,180; Oregon humane society \$10,000; Eastern Oregon livestock show \$10,000; alfalfa weevil control \$10,000 and department of Americanization \$800.

APPOINTMENT HOLDS FOR NEXT 2 YEARS

HUBBARD, Nov. 16. — It is considered unlikely here that the change in administration will turn Charles Crittendon, postmaster here for the past 14 years, out of a job. He has two more years to serve on his present appointment, and will probably be reappointed, even though a republican, for he was first appointed by Woodrow Wilson, and has been continued each term since.
The assistant postmaster under him was first his daughter Mae, until her marriage, and then his daughter Ruby, who is the present assistant.
Maud Kromling, the mail messenger, has worked in and about the postoffice for 35 years. Until recently there were two rural routes out of Hubbard. S. W. Zeb-

nar carried route 1, west of Hubbard, for 25 years, but was retired on account of his age. J. F. Palmer has served 30 years on route 2, each of Hubbard. He will serve both routes until February, when he will retire, having served his limit in years of service.

Bartruff Turnips Grow to Unusual Size This Season

Purple top turnips of unusual size, and two of which carried the scales to seven pounds, were brought to The Statesman office by Joe Bartruff, who raised the turnips on his farm a mile north of Chemawa.
