Greatly decreased supplies from out-state points have have been shown in the local trade recently but centralized May, .48 1/4 - %; July, .49 1/4 - %. production has held its own quite

well. The latest quotations in cube butter show an extreme of 25c for extras while standard and first are each at 24c pound with a difference of but 2c between lowest and highest scores.

The advance of but 1c in the price of butterfat suggests that the trade does not feel that the sharper rise in butter was justifled or can be maintained.

Trade in the egg market continues of very firm character for fresh offerings with a scarcity in the late movement from henneries. No shading of price on fresh stock but some on storage goods.

CHICAGO, Nov. 17. - (AP) -Uneasiness that followed breaks in British exchange and the resignation of the German cabinet went hand in hand with new downslides of grain values today. 
