THOUSANDS SPENT DURING CAMPAIGN

\$35,588 Against Moving U. Of O.; \$25,157 for Truck Regulation

The school tax saving association, through F. H. Young, manager, expended during the recent campaign a total of \$35,588.29, in opposing the initiative measure providing for consolidation of the University of Oregon and State Normal at Corvallis and other college at Corvallis and other educational system.

H. Ashley Ely, treasurer of the tax reduction association of Multnomah county, spent \$7754.31 in behalf of the school consolidation bill. Ely also expended \$2537 in opposition to the higher educational appropriation measure.

Oswald West, president of the Highway Protective association, spent \$25,157.58 in support of the freight truck and bus measure, while the Allied Truck Owners, Inc., through Ralph Stachil, secretary, expended \$14,338.30 in opposition to the bill. The farm truck owners association of Marion county also spent \$1889.93 in behalf of the truck and bus measure.

A total of \$3809.08 was expended by the taxpayers equalization league of Marion county in opposing the higher educational appropriation measure and in behalf of the university consolidation.

The Oregon Dairy Protective association, Oregon Dairymen's association and federated farm organizations spent \$2048.23 in support of the oleomargarine tax measure.

Other large expense accounts filled today follow: Oregon state grange, through Bertha J. Beck, secretary, in support of power bill, \$1749.14. Hoover-Curtis club of Oregon, by T. H. Bantfield, president, \$542.70.

Mott for congress committee, in behalf of James W. Mott, for representative in congress from the first congressional district, \$271.19.

George W. Joseph, in behalf of Rufus C. Holman, for state treasurer, \$349.97.

I. H. VanWinkle, for attorney general, \$202.18.

Deaths of Proper Food is Suffered By Many Children

Quite a number of school children throughout the country are being found suffering from malnutrition, Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, Marion county health officer, reported after conducting a clinic at Grant school yesterday. Rural children, particularly, are saying that their fathers are out of work and so unable to provide them with proper food.

"It is rather useless to send word home with these children that they should have more milk and other important foods," said Dr. Douglas. "So we are trying to work out provision for them through local groups."

At Grant school, the doctor found a number of children suffering from eye defects. Hearing of one child was noted to be seriously impaired. About 40 per cent of the 49 children examined had defective teeth.

AUTO DEATH TOLL INCREASING HERE

Deaths from automobile accidents in Marion county this year have almost doubled over those of 1931. Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, stated yesterday in his Oct. report to the health department executive committee. The one October auto death brought the total to date to 23 casualties, in contrast with 12 at the same time last year and 14 for all of 1931. Auto deaths in 1932 numbered 15 and in 1931, six.

Heart disease was the leading cause of death last month, with 22 casualties from this cause. Next was apoplexy, nine.

There were 19 more births than deaths in October. Of the 76 babies born, 33 were male and 43 were female. There were no infant deaths. Total births for the year to November 1, number 702, deaths 555.
