Portland Musician Receives Praise

Burrell Steer, concert violinist, appeared in concert Friday night at the Y. M. C. A. and won for himself the sincere praise of many Salem musicians. Brilliant technical facility and command of many of a group of very hard and difficult numbers led by Tschakowsky's concerto in D major, was displayed by Mr. Steer, according to enthusiastic members of his audience.

Mr. Steer was accompanied by his wife, Dorothy Rice-Steer, and equal enthusiasm was evidenced for the support which she gave him as accompanist.

The violinist was born in England and was educated in the Royal Academy of London and in Paris and Germany. He was in Germany at the outbreak of the world war, and was interned to spend the years of the war behind barbed wire. Later he returned to England and then came to the United States where he has been affiliated with the St. Louis Symphony and for the past four years head of the violin department in Drake university and conductor of the Des Moines Symphony orchestra.
