Mott Campaign Cost Reported; Relatively Low

Robert R. Butler, republican, expended \$398.90 in conducting his recent campaign for the office of representative in congress from the second judicial district, according to an expense account filed in the state department Monday. Butler was defeated by Walter M. Pierce, democrat. James W. Mott, successful republican candidate for the office of representative in congress from the first congressional district, expended \$294.41, while W. J. Butler, independent candidate for representative in congress from the first district, spent \$811.

No Resignation From Mott Due Until February

James W. Mott, who recently was elected representative in congress from the first congressional district, will not resign as state corporation commissioner before late in February, he announced Monday. The announcement was made because of the many applications for the office now being received at the executive department. Governor Meier declared recently that Mott's successor would be selected on his merits, and that politics would not enter into the appointment.

School Census Reports Tardy

Fourteen school district clerks in the county who have not yet filed the 1932 census reports in their localities should make their reports at once to the county school superintendent, Mrs. Cora Reid, office deputy, announced Monday. Pending the reports, which should be made of October 25, no appropriation of state or county school funds will be made. Under the Oregon law, schools receive, in addition to local taxes, a \$10 per census child payment annually from the county a portion of the two-mill elementary tax levied by the state, and about \$1.50 annually per child from the irreducible, permanent state school fund.

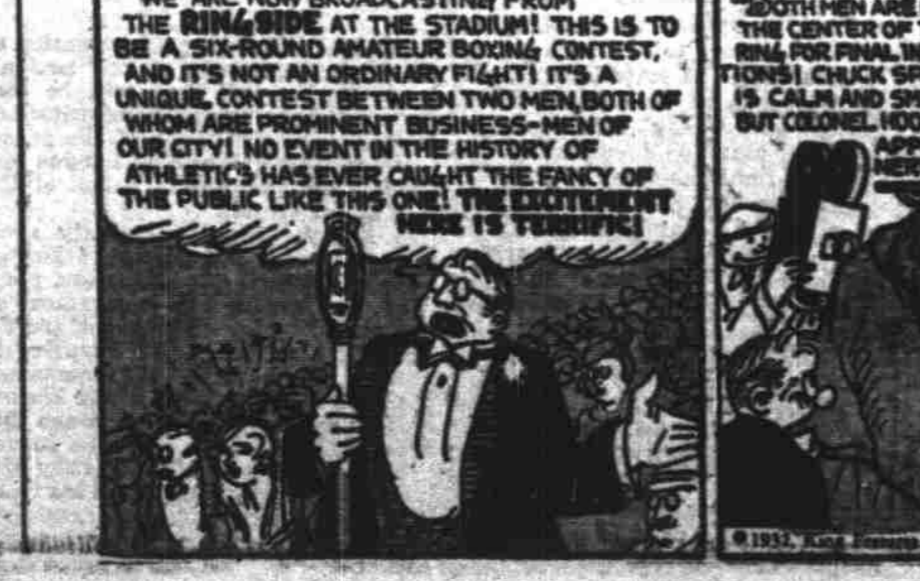
