PORTLAND, Nov. 23.—(AP)— In the opinion of leaders of the trade a lower price for eggs seems likely within the near future. E. J. Dixon, general manager of the Pacific Co-ops, said the under-tone of the trade suggested a weaker movement and a lower price which may be forced almost
