Corvallis Concert Pleases

Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Hanson invited a company of their friends to attend a musical soiree at their suburban home near Corvallis, Sunday night, to present Walter Burbaum, youthful pianist, who is on a concert tour of the west. Guests attending from Salem were Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Schram and Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Sprague. Over a hundred persons were accommodated in the spacious Hanson home.

Mr. Burbaum is a native of Vienna, Austria. His father was professor of cello in the University of Vienna. Walter grew up at the piano, playing at four, performing on the concert stage at eight, and after that touring the cities of Europe, playing in the royal palace at Madrid, at the age of nine. He studied under Josef Morfan in the Vienna Academy of Music. In 1930 he came to this country, becoming piano instructor in a conservatory in Cleveland. He is now on his first tour of the west, and came to Corvallis from Victoria.

His Sunday evening concert offered a varied program from the masters, beginning with Handel's "Andante," an unpublished number, written primarily for the organ. One of the most brilliantly played numbers was Liszt's "Concerto Etude D Flat." Others which were greatly enjoyed were Rachmaninoff's "Prelude in C Sharp Minor;" Bach-Busoni, "Toccatto;" and D'Aubert's amazingly rapid "Etude." His rendering of Johann Strauss' "Viennese Melodies and Waltzes," including the famous "Blue Danube" waltz movement was a delight.

Appeals have come to Mr. Burbaum for appearing in concerts in this state and if arrangements are made it may be that he will appear in Salem.

Work on Signatures Continues in Clubs

One of the interesting things that the club women of the United States are working upon this year is securing a sufficient list of names of women attached to a position which will be duplicated as far as necessary and sent to the rulers of foreign nations asking that a representative group of women from each country be sent to the world's fair which will be held in Chicago the summer of 1933. It is necessary that 1,000,000 names be secured by January.

The work is being sponsored by the Council of Women and in this council are 30 national women's organizations. Salem has a representative branch of five of these national organizations: Salem Women's club, Garden club, W. C. T. U., Business and Professional Women's club and the American Association of University Women.

Because of the fact that it had more numbers than any of the other clubs in Salem, aid was asked of the Women's club by a national council in securing the quota of names from Salem clubs. Mrs. J. N. Dovers has charge of this "missionary work," and is finding that there is still lacking a large number of names from the quota of Salem. She is making every effort to get in touch with the various groups when they meet in order to get them to secure signatures. Stayed by communications to her would be a large help.

At the international meeting of women, which it is hoped to be brought about at the world's fair, discussion of international problems will be taken up. These large representation from all countries the better the results, it is thought.
