### ONIONS MAKE SLOW **CLIMB TO 60 CENTS**

Weekend Boost is 10 Cents: Movement now is to Oriental Trade

LAKE LABISH, Nov. 28 -Onion growers were looking sovewhat less glum over the weskend. Some of them were actundly smiling. Portland buyers, be it known, were offering 60 cents per hundred and picking them up from the onion houses. This is an advance of 20 cents over the price of several weeks ago.

There is some optimistic predictions to the effect that they are due to rise to new heights in the ensuing weeks. With the coming of cold weather, consumption of onions is always on the increase. Soup, soup, and One aspect of the current

market which brings cheer is the fact that practically all of the onions which have moved so far have been shipped to the Orient. a market which in the past has been more or less scanty in its buying. When onions were high last year the price was too high for the Orient to meet, and apparently in the years before the buyers had no openings. This year a vast lot of onions have moved across the ocean. Some are reported to have gone so far as Australia where there is a dire shortage with onions reported selling for as much as a nickel apiece. All of this helps considerably.

In the past years when the onion market was sluggish the buyers customarily bought up enough at the low early price to meet their demands for the winter and the market often subsided completely after New Year. There is little likelihood of that for the current season, however, for the domestic trade will require many carloads, and they are yet to be purchased. There is some prospect of a dollar or more later in the season, this being contingent upon the Texas and California winter crops. Reports vary as to the quantities to be harvested in
