CORVALLIS, Nov. 30-(AP)better future for alfalfa seed is indicated in this week's review of seed markets by the U.S.D. A. bureau of agricultural economics cooperating with the O. S. C. extension service. Prices have advanced gradually but steadily while growers continued to sell freely so that it is estimated 65 per cent had passed from growers hands early in November. Last year only about 45 per cent had been moved on a corresponding date.

An advance of 60 cents in alfalfa prices has put quotations only 40 cents per hundred under a year ago, though these prices are far below those of two years ago before the sudden drop came. At that time they were \$7.60 a hun-435 dred above present quotations. Imports of alfalfa seed this year have been light and exports heavy.

### New Zealand Trade is Trying to Muscle In on Coast

PORTLAND, Nov. 30-(AP)-Weather conditions in the midwest which have stopped practically all shipments of butter to the Pacific alope, have created an entirely new situation in this sector. The previous easiness in the trade trend appears to be somewhat lessened although there was no doubt of the unwillingness of operators to purchase more than immediate requirements through fear of declining values.

The one big drawback to strength in the butter trade appears continued efforts on the part of New Zealand to market a liberal portion of its supplies on this coast. With depreciated money it is able to land butter in coast states at 4 to 5c lb. less than is being quoted for the home product even after paying the liberal transportation charges as well as heavy government tax.

Butterfat values were again mixed, Most local interests were paying 30c lb for churning cream with 2c generally additional for sweet cream. While the Pacific Co-ops were still maintaining their prices

## Powdered Milk is Said Economical Food Substitute

CORVALLIS .- Powdered skim milk purchased at 10c a pound will supply fluid skim milk at approximately 2c a quart, according to Lucy A. Case, nutrition specialist in extension, who recommends its use by those persons who wish to maintain an adequate diet on a reduced food budget. One pound of skim milk powder contains all the butterfat, and it furnishes as much of them as is usually furnished by about 4% quarts of fresh swim milk.

Miss Case advises thrifty housewives to use powdered skim milk in dishes that have considerable flavor. She suggests its use in soups, sauces, gravies, cocos, custards, ice creams, pie fillings, ods of reconstituting fluid skim milk from skim milk powder and 22 different recipes using such milk are contained in the leaflet HE 408, "The use of powdered skim milk in the home," which may be obtained at any extension office or by writing the home ecand an old-time friend who is onomics extension office, Corval-
