Dillard, of Atlanta, Ga., told police an amazing story, in which she charged that the fire had been a deliberate attempt on the part of her husband and son, Earl, to burn her alive. They further discovered that the fire had originated in a pile of kindling beneath the room where she was imprisoned. Dillard and his son are held without bond for investigation, but both vigorously deny Mrs. Dillard's story of a death plot. It was only a short time ago that Mrs. Dillard swore out a warrant against the two she accuses because of alleged threats.


