FIRE RESCUE REVEALED ALLEGED DEATH PLOT



MRS. B. E. DILLARD in "FIRE TRAP" ARROW SHOWS NAILED-UP DOOR. Hacked to safety out of a blazing room that had been securely nailed up, Mrs. B. E. Dillard, of Atlanta, Ga., told police an amazing story, in which she charged that the fire had been a deliberate attempt on the part of her husband and son, Earl, to burn her alive. Following the arrest of the husband and son, the rescued woman told authorities that the alleged attempt on her life was the climax of two years of brutality, during which she was virtually banished to one room in the house, denied food, clothing and heating and bathing facilities. The door which connected this room and the main part of the dwelling was nailed up, according to Mrs. Dillard, and she was obliged to go in and out through a back yard. When firemen went to Mrs. Dillard's rescue in the burning house, they found that both doors had been fastened on the outside. They further discovered that the fire had originated in a pile of kindling beneath the room where she was imprisoned. Dillard and his son are held without bond for investigation, but both vigorously deny Mrs. Dillard's story of a death plot. It was only a short time ago that Mrs. Dillard swore out a warrant against the two she accuses because of alleged threats.

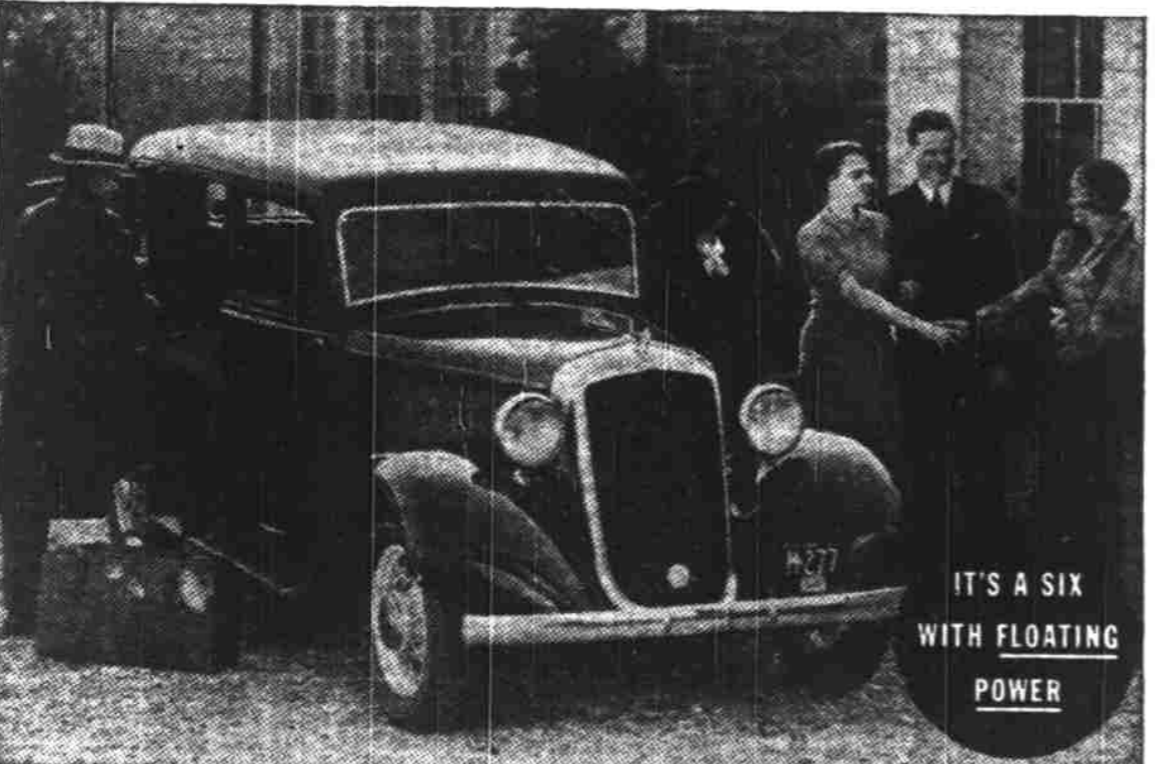
