Disturbed Situation Causes Small World Movement Last Week, Shown

New wheat crops were an important factor in the wheat market the past week, and a disturbed situation in the market reflected the smallest world movement in recent years, Market News servce reports.

Large areas in Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Texas and Colorado during the week in many sections. The condition of winter wheat in the western third of Kansas was reported at only 36 per cent of normal, with some counties as low as 15 per cent. An average condition of 65 per cent is reported for a dozen within a day or so, it is central Kansas. cluding flour, during the four months' period August through November, totaled around 195 .-25.00 000,000 bushels, compared with 275,000,000 bushels for the corresponding period last year. The bulk of these shipments, as is usual in the fall months, was from 100.00 North America, United States and Canadian overseas shipments during the period totaled about 127,-000,000 bushels as against 125,-000,000 bushels last fall. Argentine exports since the first of August have totaled around 14,000,-000 bushels compared with 26,-000,000 bushels last season and Australian shipments about 29,-000,000 buhels as against 32,000,-000 bushels through November last year.

At Portland futures prices declined about 1c and cash about %c during the week, while in California prices ranged unchanged 175 to slightly higher. The outstanding feature of the

northern hemisphere shipments this season is the increase in Canadian and the decrease in U. S. exports. Last season the U.S. sent overseas about 65,000,000 bushels vear Canada has shipped around 105,000,000 bushels and the U.S. only a little over 20,000,000 bushels. Over half of this came from Atlantic ports and shipments from the Gulf ports and the Pacific coast have been unusually small.
